Learning in Action!

Solar-powered Cars

On February 16, students from Mrs. Gorney's 4/5 Grade split class at Tenniswood Elementary built their very own solar-powered cars! The project was made possible thanks to community funding through an organization called Donors Choose. At the time, students had been learning about the different kinds of energy and this project allowed them to see how it works in real time.

Demi, a 5th Grader, really enjoyed learning about what was in the cars. 4th Grader Layla said she enjoys building things, so she loved being able to build her own car.

With a little help from their principal, Dr. Sedick, and a couple of dads volunteering their time, this exciting project was a success!

Planetarium

On March 2, students at Middle School - North were treated with an 'out of this world' presentation from the Michigan Science Center! Mrs. Krcek organized the traveling exhibit for all the 8th Grade Science classes. The inflatable exhibit was set up in the school's gymnasium. Inside, a projector displayed the video seamlessly onto the top of the dome. Once students had been seated, the virtual Planetarium took the class on a tour through our solar system and into the far reaches of space.

At the time, students were learning about the Earth, Sun and Moon, formations and motions of galaxies, and the solar system. This exhibit applied everything they had been learning in class, while also providing a fun and entertaining light show!

Mad City Money

On March 30, students in Mrs. Culver's business class at LCHS had the chance to try out real world budgeting, thanks to Freestar Financial Credit Union's Mad City Money simulation. Students used an app to decide on a career, then visited stations to budget for various categories including housing, leisure, clothing, food, lifestyle, and electronics.

Once they were settled on a budget, they would spin a wheel filled with unexpected life happenings called The Fickle Finger of Fate. This wheel would give them either a positive or negative life event, causing them to earn or lose money. For example, students could earn a monetary bonus from work, or they could be involved in a fender bender and have to pay to get their car fixed.

"My college loan is messing my budget up," one student commented. Another stated, "The Fickle Finger of Fate gave me a speeding ticket. That was not in my budget."

Wax Museum

On March 30, 4th Graders at Green Elementary brought history to life for their Wax Museum project. The project started as a simple biography assignment, with students researching and writing about an influential figure of their choice. Once their piece was written, students let their creativity shine and turned their writing into a full presentation, complete with costumes, wigs, and posterboards.

On the day of the presentation, students donned their costumes, lined the Green cafeteria, and froze – just like a wax figure – until a guest pressed a button to bring them to life.

Some of the historical figures present were Martin Luther King Jr., Frida Kahlo, and George Washington. Other students chose to represent celebrities and athletes, like Dwayne Johnson, Cristiano Ronaldo, and Alex Morgan.

Chalk Poetry

During the week of April 28, students at Middle School - East participated in a Playful Poetry event, taking bits and pieces of books in their media center to make fun poems of their very own! Once created, students used chalk to write their masterpieces on the sidewalks outside the school and on posters to be hung in the hallways.

The goal of this event, along with others from throughout the year, is aimed at providing students with positive experiences in the school's media center to showcase it as a helpful and enriching resource for students.

Wrapping and Taping

On May 11, Health Science students at the Frederick V. Pankow Center practiced their wrapping and taping skills on each other! As a group, students chose a part of the body and learned techniques to properly wrap and secure the limb in place. After practicing, students used their newfound skills to put together a presentation aimed at teaching their classmates the technique they learned.

As part of the Career and Technical classes at Pankow, students are learning real-world techniques they can apply in a future healthcare profession!

Science Made Fun!

In March, Rocket Ryan from Science Made Fun visited a few elementary schools to show young students how fun Science can really be! While at Carkenord Elementary, Ryan visited Mrs. Quick's 3rd Grade class to provide real-world examples for things they were learning in school. Students were put into groups and participated in several different experiments for some physics fun!

One experiment had students testing out momentum by using a spinning bicycle wheel to turn in circles. Another activity showcased the effects of friction on a toy car when it is raced down different surfaces.

Family Science Night

Bugs, fossils, and slingshots – oh my! On March 7, Higgins Elementary hosted their Family Science Night, filling the school's hallways with boundless excitement and curiosity! Provided by the Cranbrook Institute of Science, the displays all featured fun activities for students and their families to explore.

There was something for everyone to enjoy – students could get a close up look at their favorite bugs, play around with a plasma ball, or dig for fossils and owl bones. Those brave enough were given the opportunity to eat an insect and pet a hissing cockroach!

Cardboard Regatta

The Cardboard Regatta made a triumphant return this year! The Annual event is a way for high school physics students to test their knowledge in the best way possible – by racing against their classmates! The challenge students face every year is to build a cardboard boat sturdy enough to float with two passengers, yet sleek enough to sail past competitors.

Students were encouraged to decorate their boats, resulting in a fun variety of designs, decorations, and costumes. Creativity was on full display this year, with boats ranging from Jurassic Park and Scooby Doo themes to a jumbo-sized Little Caesar's Pizza box.

Shining a Light: EL Program

As many go about their day, they may not realize all the wonderful work that goes on behind the scenes to help our students thrive. This section is dedicated to "Shining a Light" on the programs, students, and staff that make our district so special. In this issue, we cover the English Learners Support Program and the amazing staff who dedicate themselves to helping students of all languages and backgrounds succeed in L'Anse Creuse.

English Learners Support Program

Students in L'Anse Creuse Public Schools come from a wide range of backgrounds. The EL Program works specifically with students who do not speak English as their first language.

The program consists of 10 paraprofessionals, many of whom are bilingual or trilingual, who support over 270 English Learners throughout the district.

The paraprofessionals, who often work with a very heavy caseload, are able to make personal connections with students and help them thrive not only academically, but socially and emotionally as well.

"The key ingredient is their compassion and flexibility," said EL Coordinator Beth Linenberg. "I would not be able to do this job without the EL paraprofessionals and cannot emphasize this truth enough."

Angelica Temrowski is a paraprofessional at the elementary level, working mostly at Higgins and Carkenord. Her students come from a variety of backgrounds, like 5th Grader Oleksandr (Sasha), who's family immigrated to the U.S. from Ukraine.

When Sasha first started at Carkenord Elementary less than a year ago, he knew very little English – now he is speaking in sentences and working on word segment combinations.

"This job is so rewarding," Temrowski said. "To see the growth of these kids means the world to me."

At L'Anse Creuse High School - North, the EL students benefit greatly from the amazing team who are there to help them through the highs and lows of high school.

Michelle Misuraca is an LCHS-N senior and immigrant from Italy. As a senior, Michelle said she is ready to be done with school, but the departure is bittersweet.

During her junior and senior year, she worked very closely with the EL staff who she said encouraged her to be a better student when she had no motivation to go to school.

"It wasn't that they were just telling me," Michelle said, "they had the patience to sit there with me and help me."

Since her parents don't know academic English, Michelle relied a lot on the EL staff to help her understand and complete her homework. She credits EL teacher Ms. Cardeccia and paraprofessionals Mrs. Cykon and Mrs. Hemphill for helping her and said she is incredibly grateful to have had them to turn to.

The staff, Michelle said, helped her with anything she had going on in her life – academic or personal – without fear of being judged.

"I had a lot of support," she said. "I don't think I would have passed anything if it weren't for all of them."

Diversity Summit 2023

On February 14, high school students in the Diversity Club attended the Macomb Intermediate School District's 8th Annual Diversity Summit. The summit is held to encourage student leaders all over Macomb County to promote more diversity in their communities and schools.

Ukrainian immigrant Mariia Bondarenko is an EL student and sophomore at LCHS-N. This year, she spoke as a panelist during one of the sessions, detailing her experiences as an immigrant in the U.S. and telling her personal story.

Mariia enjoyed being on the panel and having people ask her questions. She hopes that after hearing the discussion, people will show more kindness and empathy towards immigrants.
