



Nominees' Personal Professional Statement**

A. Profile the contributions to L'Anse Creuse Public Schools. Present your specific contributions. How did they support a fulfilling education for your students?

Dr. Frank A. Higgins, Superintendent of L'Anse Creuse Schools at the time, wrote in a letter to Wayne State University (December 12, 1985) on behalf of Mr. Miller, in which the second paragraph says:

"If I were to list the many accomplishments of Mr. Miller, it would require a ream of paper. Therefore, I have elected to mention only a few of his accomplishments."

Our committee is choosing to do the same.

1. An Outstanding Teacher - The Teacher of the Year nomination packet written by the middle school staff starts this way:

"Mel Miller caught it when he was only a freshman at St. Louis High School in Mt. Clemens. While it is highly contagious, it is not easily understood or often noticed. It causes no illness; yet catching it can greatly alter your life. What Mel caught as a high school freshman was a whole lot of enthusiasm for teaching and for social studies. "

In the 13 years that Mel taught social studies in L'Anse Creuse, he never lost his enthusiasm for teaching, his desire to make social studies COME ALIVE for his students, his creative ways of presenting lessons, his passion for trying to meet the needs of all students and his 150 percent effort to go beyond expectations be it his own or others. The National Reviewer who came to L'Anse Creuse to meet and evaluate Mel after he was ranked in the top 4 for National Teacher of the Year, asked him,

"With all this outpouring of creative energy will Mel Miller "burn out?" "NO!" he said, adding, "But if I ever do, it will be no one's fault but my own".

Almost every letter of support for his nomination details specific aspects of his teaching that makes it very noteworthy so we will not detail them here. Additionally, a copy of the Teacher of the Year Packet is included in the Appendix and it also details teaching methods along with some pictures. However, being named L'Anse Creuse Teacher of the Year, Michigan Teacher of the Year, and runner-up in the National Teacher of the Year should provide sufficient insight and documentation that he was a **truly exceptional educator** and teaching was his calling!

2. Runner Up for National Teacher of the Year 1981-82

Mel was the **FIRST teacher in the history of L'Anse Creuse to ever be named Michigan Teacher of the Year**, a program that has been in place since 1952. L'Anse Creuse has been blessed with many exceptional teachers throughout its' history and to date only 2 teachers from L'Anse Creuse have ever had the distinction of being selected Michigan Teacher of the Year. Further, a review of winners shows that L.C. is one of only 6 school districts out of the current 532 in the state that has had multiple winners. **Mel is the only teacher from L.C. to make it into the national**

finals. The question is how does this benefit L’Anse Creuse and its’ students? **Its’ immeasurable!** The amount of positive press for the district from having a teacher named Michigan Teacher of the Year and then duplicated again a few months later for runner-up in National Teacher of the Year affects the culture of the district and the overall impression of the district to name two things readily apparent. Positive culture affects performance. Across the district, teachers, parents and students were all taking pride in the fact that an L.C. teacher got this award (and that was whether you even knew the teacher!) and realtors LOVED it. **This is a piece of L’Anse Creuse history worth recording.**

3. In 1984, Mel began teaching half-time in L’Anse Creuse and serving part time as a social studies consultant at the Macomb Intermediate School District. In September of 1987, Mel moved to full time at the MISD. In this new roll he expanded the number of lives he touched and serviced all 21 school districts in Macomb County working with teachers, administrators, students and parents. Three of the support letters (Holbert, Hickey and DeVault) in this nomination packet confirm that L’Anse Creuse continued to benefit from the work Mel Miller was doing in social studies, locally, statewide and nationally during the time he was employed at the Macomb Intermediate School District.

B. Why did you choose to become involved with the district?

When Mr. Miller graduated from The University of Michigan with his Bachelor’s Degree, teaching jobs within the state were few and far between, in fact, almost nonexistent unless you were in very specialized areas. He applied in Illinois and obtained a position at Harrison Elementary School in Wonder Lake, Illinois. While he loved teaching and Harrison Elementary, he found himself getting restless and desiring to return to Michigan. So, in 1974 he applied to L’Anse Creuse Public Schools, a district he was familiar with having graduated from St. Louis Catholic High School in Mt. Clemens. Mr. James Dooley, the principal of Middle School North at the time, took great pride in being the person who recommended Mel for employment in the L.C. district. Mel taught for 13 years in L’Anse Creuse, the majority of those year were at Middle School North.

C. What led you to contribute above and beyond expected requirements of your position?

To answer this question, we have chosen to draw from a number of writings as well as interviews for newspapers and previous letters of commendation that we believe give insight into why Mel always seemed to go above and beyond the requirements for whatever he was engaged in. Documentation of these articles and letters are in the Appendix of this nomination packet.

The following is a slightly edited quote taken from the philosophy statement written by Mel in his application for Michigan Teacher of the Year:

“I have had the good fortune of choosing and being accepted in one of the noblest of professions – the education of our youth. I originally made this choice years ago after experiencing the expertise and enthusiasm of my high school social studies teacher. He viewed education as a challenge to be met with the highest standards. I have attempted to carry on this idea of academic excellence by making my classes a meaningful experience for students. A main goal is that these students become efficient and effective citizens with an appreciation of their rich heritage. I have tried to make coursework come alive, celebrating student enthusiasm as a means toward the acquisition of the skills and knowledge needed to appreciate and succeed in life.”

Perhaps one of the most telling factors that contributes to his desire to do everything 150% is revealed in numerous newspaper articles as well as writings by several of his colleagues. The **Good Housekeeping** magazine article in 1982 sums it up this way:

“Learning was not always fun for Mel Miller. As a child, he had difficulty reading and spelling and consequently suffered the pain of his classmates jibes and his teacher’s frustrations. Through sheer will-power and long hours of extra work he overcame his weakness, graduating second highest in his high school class.

A Detroit News Article in 1981 goes on to quote Mel:

He said he identifies with students who have had difficulty with reading problems because he had similar problems when he was a child. “All through elementary school I was in a low group and it bothered me.”

The narrative in the Teacher of the Year packet quotes Mel as saying:

He identifies with students having a hard time and regularly asks himself, “How can I help them? He does so by developing classroom projects and activities that provide choice and flexibility that do not lock students into their weak skill areas.

In an Adviser news article, he went on to say, “I don’t always hit 100 percent, but I try as much as possible.”

Mel worked very hard as a youth to prove to himself and others that he did not belong in the lowest group. It took a lot of hard work to overcome his learning problems and he worked equally hard to provide his students a learning environment that emphasized their strengths rather than weaknesses. In all this hard work, he created an incredible work ethic! Did he carry this exceptional work ethic into his adult life to reassure himself and others he was extremely capable? Who knows, but whatever the reason, our L’Anse Creuse students, our teachers as well as those in Macomb County and the entirety of folks invested in the social studies discipline are benefactors of this amazing educator.

Mr. Phillip E. Runkle, Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of Michigan, in a letter dated November 13, 1981, to Mr. William F. Pierce, Executive Director, Council of Chief State School Officers wrote this:

“Mr. Miller’s teaching is a reflection of his educational philosophy, he encourages students to develop and refine their thought processes with the realization that education is a never-ending process; never a final achievement.”

“A teacher can never tell where his influence stops.”

Henry Adams

Summary: The following is adapted from the Teacher of the Year nomination packet for Mel. We could not say it better.

“Poor indeed is the man whose mind is not enriched by some lasting memory of a teacher whose enthusiasm, creativity, and great love for learning were woven into each lesson. For a teacher who can arouse this same spirit into each student accomplishes more than he who fills our memory with rows of information, classified by name.”

Each of us needs in his heart’s treasury the memory of such a teacher as described above – one who makes learning exciting, yet sets standards that prompt each individual to strive for excellence. Mel Miller was such a teacher! He worked diligently to make classroom experiences meaningful for all. His enthusiasm for learning was contagious. The simulations and activities he created provided students with that enriching, lasting memory.

Mel Miller was truly a master teacher. However, this is not the only area in which he excelled. He is described in support letters as compassionate, possessing boundless energy and a love of people, a leader among teachers – contributing much to social studies on a state and national level. He recognized the need for rewarding excellence and was the initiator of state awards for secondary students excelling in social studies and for outstanding student teachers of social studies. He single-handedly led a campaign to have a district parent and a district principal recognized at the state level for their achievements in education.

More recently, the Interfaith Center for Racial Justice in partnership with the Macomb Intermediate School District established an award to honor a teacher for serving as an advocate for social justice. This award was established in memory of Mel who they sought to honor for seeking to teach students the highest level of personal involvement in the pursuit of equality for others.

Mel Miller brought considerable honor and pride to this district. It is now our opportunity to acknowledge and show our appreciation for his many contributions to L’Anse Creuse, our students, our staff, and community by naming him to the L’Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction.

Dear L'Anse Creuse Public Schools Hall of Distinction Committee:

It is my great pleasure to support Mel Miller for long-overdue but richly-deserved inclusion into the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction. While Mel taught in L'Anse Creuse for only thirteen years, his impact and influence extended far beyond the reach of many excellent L'Anse Creuse teachers who have worked with students three times as long.

Mel and I were both hired with a number of first year teachers to work at L'Anse Creuse Middle School - North. Mel had previously taught in Illinois, and instantly became a leader and model for many of us younger teachers in the fall of 1974. Mel's professionalism became an inspiration for all of us working along side him. Where many of us struggled to create workable daily lesson plans in our first or second year of teaching, Mel's seventh grade Social Studies lessons seemed to seamlessly grow from daily plans, to weekly plans, and into unit plans and beyond. His influence over our building extended beyond Room 206, the room where he provided seventh graders with excellent lessons around the Social Studies curriculum of early American history. Even in that first year he had a grasp of enlivening lessons, often dressing up as a character from the era that his students were discussing. His sense of detail extended to decorating with cardboard apples every corner of every ceiling tile in his classroom. While many of us were concerned with student discipline, Mel understood from the first year that the best way to approach student behavior was by creating thought-provoking lessons tailored to middle schoolers. I don't recall him ever complaining about a student's behavior.

In subsequent years, he became the Social Studies Department Chair, extending his innovative instructional methods to Social Studies instruction school-wide. His influence reached further when he added Student Council Sponsor to his resume, extending his fingerprints beyond the classroom and Social Studies department to the entire school. His positive influence broadened to writing comedic plays filled with the "groaner" puns which he enjoyed so much. Many of our faculty participated in them, to the delight of our student body. I'll never forget that Mel even wrote Larry Rancilio, then an MS-N math teacher, into one of his scripts as Inspector Columbo. Mel's energy, professionalism, and accomplishments at Middle School -North were recognized in 1981 when he was named Michigan Teacher of the Year for the 1981-1982 school year, the first and, as far as I know, only L'Anse Creuse teacher to be so honored. He was named as a finalist and runner-up for National Teacher of the Year in 1982.

Unfortunately, soon the economy and eventually school funding declined shortly thereafter, shuffling many of us to different buildings and teaching assignments. In 1983-84 Mel taught at Graham Elementary, before we shared an assignment at L'Anse Creuse Middle School - South, one of us teaching in the mornings, the other, in the afternoons. Mel's professional influence even in half-days, however, continued to expand, since when he wasn't teaching at MS-S, he was working at the Macomb Intermediate School District, spreading his passion for Social Studies to the entire county. He moved to the MISD full time in the Fall, 1987. Before Covid-19 prevented live events, an award in Mel's honor and memory was given every year at the annual County MLK Dinner.

L'Anse Creuse Public Schools have employed a number of outstanding teachers over the many years that I've been a part of the district, but I can't remember one who made such a positive impact building-, district-, and state-wide in such a short time. Mel Miller richly deserves inclusion in the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction.

As former colleagues of Mel Miller, we highly recommend Mel's selection into the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction. His dedication to education left a lasting mark on Middle School North – a mark truly worthy of this distinguished honor.

As a classroom teacher, Mel was passionate about his subject matter. His classroom centered around an active learning environment. He dressed up as historical figures, enhancing his instruction and encouraging students to relate to the time period he was covering. When teaching the judicial process, he dressed as a judge as students participated in mock trials. He often would have students debate current events. Mel truly cared about his students. At the end of each six week marking period, he privately conferenced with every student to discuss their strengths and recommendations for improvement.

Mel's philosophy was always "school is more than just a classroom". During presidential elections, he spearheaded school-wide voting to encourage student participation. He oversaw the writing of *Northern Reflections*, a detailed history of Middle School North, requiring many hours of student research. Additionally, he was the advisor for *Crusader Chronicles*, the school newspaper. One of our fondest memories involves the staff acting in several plays that Mel wrote, directed and even starred in performing such "classics" as *The Perils of Pauline*, *The Good Ol' 50's*, *Rudy*, *Where Are You?*, and *British School 1776*, based on the television show "Welcome Back Kotter". Students thoroughly enjoyed these performances, and furthermore, they allowed the staff to be seen as more than just "classroom educators".

One of Mel's greatest strengths was his contribution to the school environment as advisor to the National Junior Honor Society. During his time as advisor, the Honor Society was instrumental in promoting school spirit, including selling Sweet Season's Greetings during the holiday season, Valentine-O-Grams in February, and guessing the Mystery Gobbler at Thanksgiving. Money raised through these activities was donated to charity. Under his direction, Honor Society members delivered Easter baskets to patients at Martha T Berry Medical Care Facility, planted trees and flowers on school grounds as part of a school beautification project, provided a needy family with Christmas dinner, and once a month would clean all the student desks. Through these service projects, Mel initiated the tradition of selecting an Honor Society member for an Outstanding Service Award. In addition to being the Honor Society advisor, Mel coordinated the VIP Club and the monthly Citizenship Hall of Fame.

In his time at Middle School North, Mel Miller is remembered as a dedicated, passionate classroom teacher and a valued colleague who helped create an environment that fostered much more than "just a school". For these reasons, we fully support his nomination and his selection to the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction.

MEL MILLER and the L'ANSE CREUSE HALL of DISTINCTION

MEL MILLER was an outstanding educator, a patriot, a freedom fighter, an intelligent and quick-witted punster, and a kind and supremely respectful and honorable person. Mel's fellow educators recognized his outstanding character and abilities and nominated him to be our L'Anse Creuse Middle School North "Teacher of the Year". Teachers spend much of their careers locked away in classrooms isolated with student, detached from recognition for the work that they so diligently perform. Our staff made an exception to all that by nominating Mel Miller as our "Teacher of the Year". Mel went on to be Macomb County's Teacher of the Year, then the State of Michigan's Teacher of the Year, and ended up being the First Runner-Up for National Teacher of the Year!

Teaching and learning can be difficult tasks. Mel understood that profoundly and personally. As a young student, he encountered difficulty with reading, and with that tribulation came some thoughtless teasing and ridicule – a painful embarrassment. Mel met the challenge; he became determined to read, struggled to do so, and ultimately became a scholarly reader and a master of communication: a teacher, a consultant, and an educational leader. He actually developed his linguistic ability such that he could play with language - to create wit and humor. Mel became an incorrigible punster! The occasional visit by Mel to the teachers' lounge was inevitably accompanied by some of Mel's witty puns, group laughter, comradery, and a few groans. Some people call puns "groaners". But the groans mask the buried reaction of listeners: "Wow. That was funny! I wish I'd thought of that!" Much humor contains harm: ridicule, sarcasm, bullying, hurt. Puns are different. They are witty plays-on- words. They display intelligent creative wit, not harm. Mel Miller was an irrepressible punster whose humor was warm and witty, and delightful.

Mel Miller was the sponsor of the L'Anse Creuse Middle School North National Junior Honor Society. Membership in this organization is based on four criteria: Scholarship, Service, Leadership, and Character. Admission to this group was based on academic performance and recognition by staff of the other qualifying behaviors. How appropriate that Mel Miller would sponsor and lead the LCMSN Honor Society in service projects. He embodied the example. Mel exemplified Honor.

Holidays at middle schools were often "dress-up days" and of course staff joined in. Mel, our dynamic Social Studies character most often appeared as a colonial era patriot in rustic trousers, linen shirt, a three-pointed hat, with a characteristic Miller smile. He brought history to life. Our Freedoms embodied in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights were all part of Mel's Social Studies. The word "freedom" has a synonym: "LIBERTY". And "Liberty" comes originally from two words in French that meant "freedom to grow". The articles in our Bill of Rights all (for the most part) embody this theme. Many patriots and freedom fighters dedicate their lives to supporting and advancing and defending the freedom to grow. Mel Miller taught liberty. Mel Miller lived it. Mel Miller honored it. And Mel's students learned to take ownership in their own lives for honoring their own freedom to grow.

We lost Mel to cancer in 2006 at the age of 57. By any standard it was too soon. His passing was reminiscent of lyrics from an Elton John song:

The candle burned out long before the legends ever died.

Let's keep Mel Miller's legacy alive and honor this Teacher of the Ages with inclusion in the Hall of Distinction.

Additionally he also gave me the confidence, foundation and leadership skills to run and be elected President for the class of 1984 in both my Junior and Senior years.

Another reason, why I strongly feel Mr. Miller deserves this award is how he continued to set an example to pursue my bachelor's degree double majoring in Social Studies and Business. His mentorship and role model as an educator would lead not only myself but others to follow in his footsteps. To name just a few who also support this nomination are Gina Tava-Walsh (Higgins Elementary), Mrs. Alison Schoen-White and Mrs. Charlene Schoen-Barrett (South River Elementary).

Another example of his many contributions are the valuable professional development workshops he conducted at the Macomb Intermediate School District for teachers across the county. Mel Miller and I taught together for one semester at L'Anse Creuse Middle School North in the fall of 1974, and also for three years at Middle School South in the mid-eighties. Beyond that, Mel and I became close personal friends until his death in 2006.

As an educator, Mel had many strong qualities. His lesson plans were always structurally sound because he was well organized, relevant, and interesting. As an example, when he taught the judicial system, he would conduct realistic trials. Mel would be dressed in legal robes as the judge, and students acted as lawyers, witnesses, and defendants. Each student had a role, and those roles were rotated so that each student received the total legal experience. Quite fun! Mel's greatest trait was his creativity, always coming up with innovative ideas to grab student interest.

His creativity led to many awards, accomplishments, and job offers. In 1981-82, Mel was recognized as L'Anse Creuse Teacher of the Year, which led to Michigan Teacher of the Year, and ultimately, as United States Teacher Runner-up. These creative skills were noticed by the Intermediate School Districts of both Oakland and Macomb counties. So Mel left L'Anse Creuse in 1987 to pursue a career as social studies consultant, a job he held until he became ill with cancer in the early two thousands.

When Mel and I began our teaching careers in L'Anse Creuse in 1974, we became good friends and our families shared many activities. It was quite a jolt when he discovered cancer and after a few years passed on. I still miss him and I'm sure L'Anse Creuse, and education in general do too. I feel Mel overwhelmingly deserves this honor as his credentials are impeccable. Thank you.

It was later announced that Mel Miller was selected as Michigan's Teacher of the Year.

Mel brought so many gifts to Middle School North besides his excellent teaching. He started a V.I.P. club where students helped collect food and clothing for those in need in Honduras. His students also helped with a can food drive for the Salvation army, Open House hostesses and hosts, and sold bagels to raise money for a dance.

Mel also became the National Junior Honor Society Sponsor the following year for the 8th graders at MSN. He brought the clever idea of selling Sweet Seasons Greetings to the student body as a fund raiser. His positive efforts made Honor Society students become confident leaders. Mel had a great sense of humor and brought the famous 'Gobble Turkey' contest, involving teachers and raising money for food baskets for our community at Thanksgiving.

Mel Miller was a good friend and colleague. Mel was very creative and wrote three plays that the Middle School North staff would practice after school hours. We would surprise our classes with a fun and humorous staff play for the entire student body. The plays were a huge hit with the students! The school felt like a warm community by bringing the staff and students together for these productions.

Mel Miller was one of those special teachers that any parent would want their son or daughter to have in middle school. I support the decision that Mel Miller will be honored by inducting him into the L'Anse Creuse Public School Hall of Distinction.

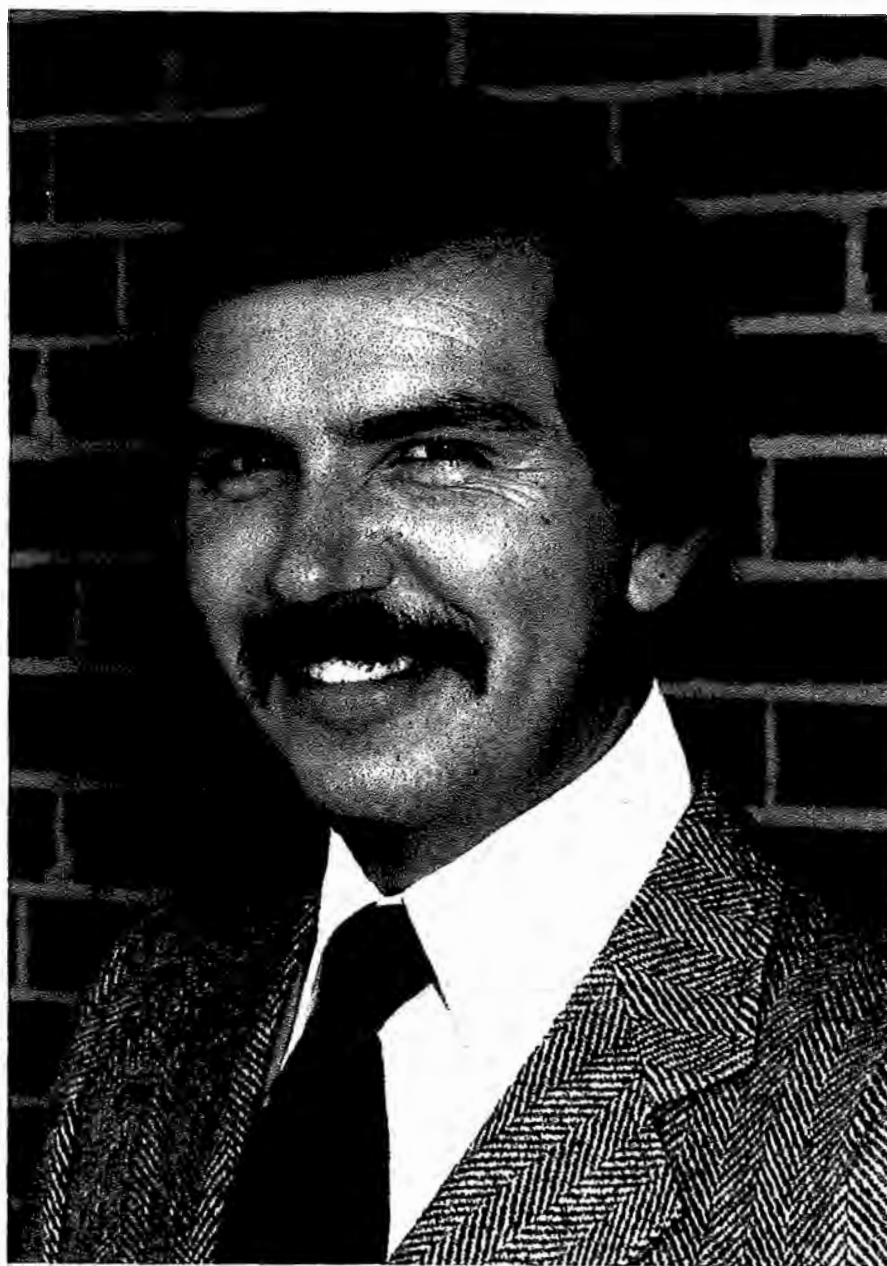

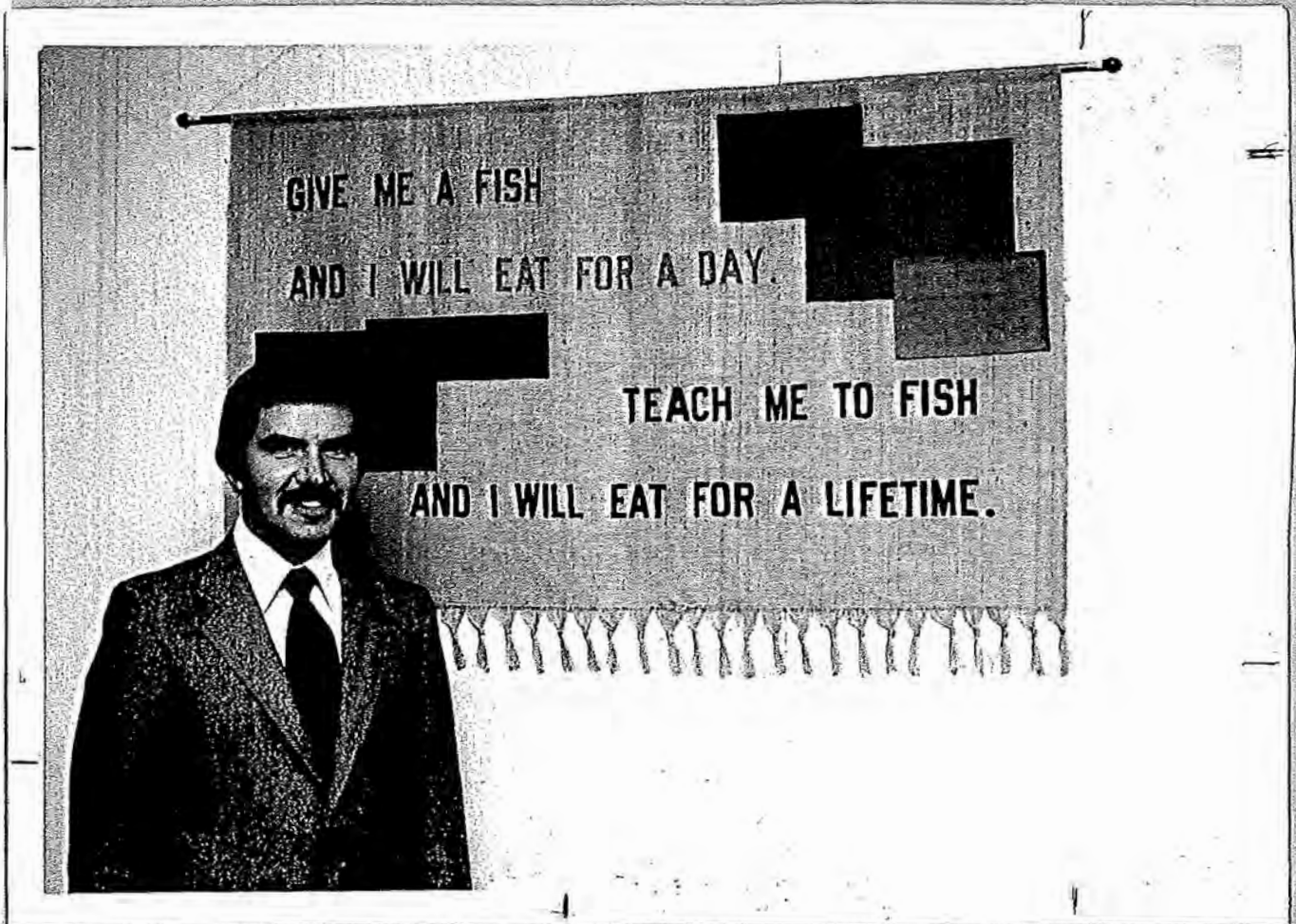

MR. MEL MILLER

Mel Miller caught it when he was only a freshman at St. Louis High School in Mt. Clemens. While it is highly contagious, it is not easily understood or often noticed. It causes no illness; yet catching it can greatly alter your life. What Mel Miller caught as a high school freshman was a whole lot of enthusiasm for teaching, for social studies and for liberty. Liberty means being free to grow and is a governing principle in our society and in Mr. Mel Miller.

Mel's inspiration was high school teacher Mr. John Labonish, a social studies teacher who came to be a model for Mel. Like Mr. Labonish did then, Mel Miller today brings social studies to life for his students. He spreads that still contagious enthusiasm and engages his students, through a variety of well organized activities, in the process of their own learning. He involves them, leads them on a journey of discovering and urges them to use their own reasoning, insights and investigative abilities to arrive at new understandings. He is a teacher who inspires both learning and the search for truth, like Socrates of ancient Athens. He does this in a field of study where opinions vary and confusing abstractions abound. That Mel teaches at the Middle School level, where so many students operate intellectually at concrete levels, makes his excellence as a teacher all the more remarkable.

Learning was not easy for Mel in his early years. Reading was difficult for him, and he painfully recalls being in the "low group" in elementary school and being taunted by more successful students. The struggle with learning that he encountered on his path to being salutatorian of his high school class and earning honors his senior year in college, have aided him in being an empathetic teacher today. He can identify with the students who have a hard time. He regularly asks himself, "How can I help them?" He does so by developing classroom projects and activities that provide choice and flexibility that do not lock students into their weak skill areas. The wide range of choices can draw upon art talents, graph making talents, dramatic abilities, ethnic cookery, construction ability and a host of skills in addition to reading and language. This flexibility in planning means that all students in his class receive encouragement and the means to achieve, thus building their self images and ultimately aiding their educational attainments. Mel compassionately plans for and meets the individual needs of his students.

Mel credits his mother with being a strong influence in his life. Mrs. Eleanor Miller was a very selfless and service oriented person. Mel recalls helping his mother, who was a VFW Chairperson for the Rehabilitation Committee, to prepare Thanksgiving food baskets and Christmas gifts for needy families. Mel today continues this kind of work and is also teaching the value of service to a new generation of youth at Middle School North. He sponsors the Junior National Honor Society, the service organization within the school that performs numerous charitable functions in this community.

Mel's interest in social studies and his willingness to serve his community led him to become active in politics. He campaigned for and met Robert Kennedy during the 1960's. While campaigning in a ghetto, Mel met people with little, who seemed quite happy. They were willing to give generously in support of their beliefs in an effort to improve our society. The same campaign led him to visit an affluent suburban community where the people he met were wealthy in the materialistic sense, yet less happy, much less generous, and seemingly entrapped by their values. Mel knew then

that service to his fellow man and personal enjoyment and fulfillment in life were riches more valuable than any materialistic wealth.

Mel, like his father, is a practical man. His dad, Mr. Irvin Miller, applies his practicality to solving mechanical, electrical and engineering problems. Mel applies his practicality to the tasks of teaching more effectively. He is a master of organization and time management. He is forever searching for ideas, activities and simulations that will improve the learning of his students, and he uses his insights and imagination to create new approaches. Mel's Dad recently applied for a patent on a heating system. Mel is currently preparing a pamphlet on time management and has shared numerous practical ideas with his colleagues through his writing and presentations at state and national conferences. Both Millers know how to effectively and efficiently get things done.

Social studies is a living experience for Mel. He shares this by giving his students the opportunity to experience it as well. They become travelers on a wagon train, or members of a legislative body. A "Millersville" Courtroom trial comes alive in his classroom with students in the roles of jury, attorneys and witnesses. A heritage project provides the experience of ethnic dress, food and a taste of strange wonderful cultures. On another occasion, a trading game takes place. Suddenly, secret rules, known only to a few players, become operational. The frustrating experience of trying hard and constantly losing becomes an experiential lesson in the effects of prejudice and discrimination. Social studies as taught by Mel Miller, is a living, thinking, feeling experience full of wonder, excitement and discovery.

Of his many personal qualities, Mel is above all respectful of others. Even Mel's brand of humor is characteristic of his respect for fellow man. Mel is a punster, a veritable master of the play on words. While his puns may sometimes be received with groans, the beauty of his humor is that a pun is humor without victim. Look at most humor and you will find a victim, an element of pain. Mel's humor is free of that; it's pure intellectual play and enjoyment. The respect that Mel gives to others earns respect in return. This is true in all of his relationships. He has a bumper sticker on his car which reads, "Kids are people, too!" and all his actions as an educator clearly acclaim this belief.

Mel Miller's motto is "Happiness is activity. It is a running stream, not a stagnant pool." He leads an active, happy life doing well work that he loves and values. He gives generously of himself - his contagious enthusiasm, his empathy, his insights, his skills and talents, his organizational ability, his intelligence, his research, his leadership, his appreciation for the varied richness of life, his love of learning, his respect, his patience, his humor, his time and energy in service to his fellow man - and Mel Miller thus enriches the lives of those around him. Mel Miller is himself a model of liberty and of what an outstanding educator should be - A MOST FITTING TEACHER OF THE YEAR!.

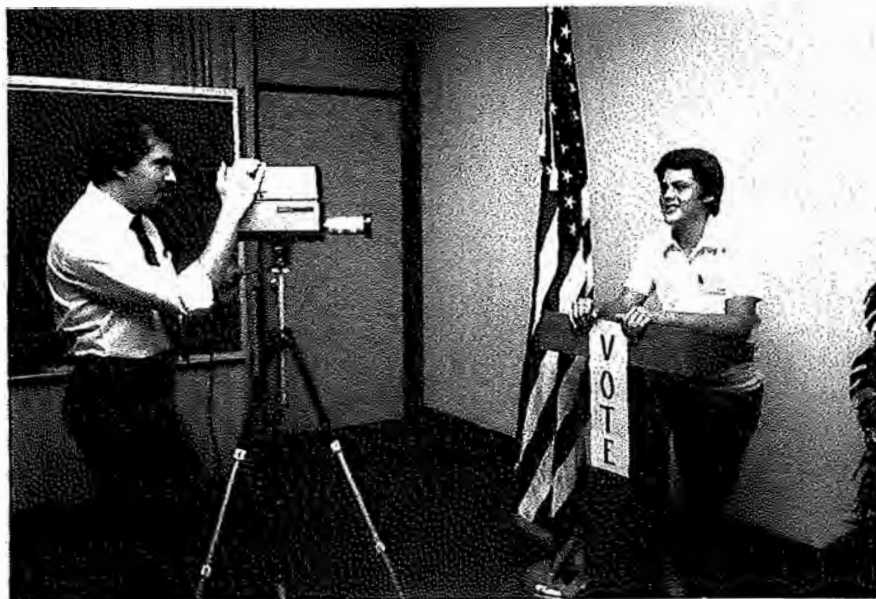

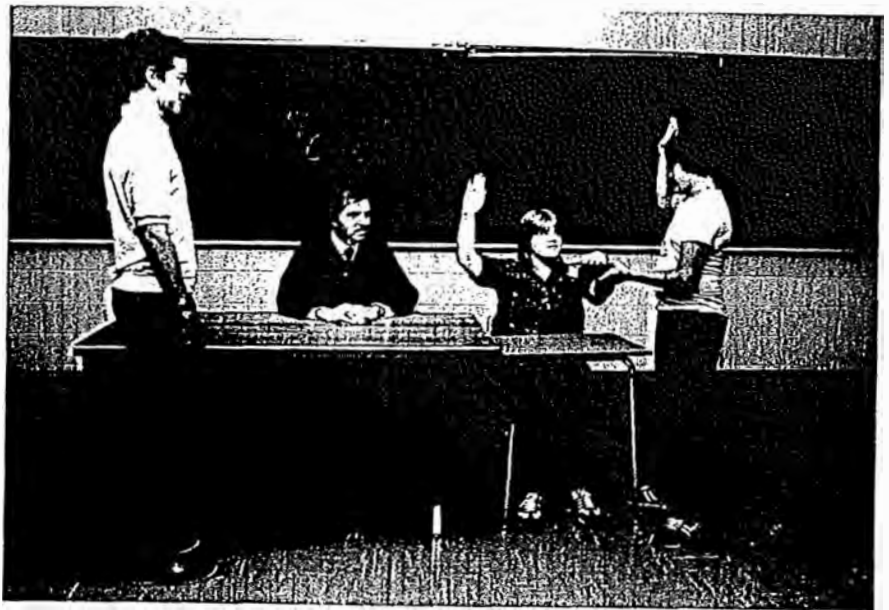
Mock Campaigns

The class discusses the kind of case that will be tried. They brainstorm ideas. Mel takes the ideas and develops the scenario. Lawyers must first interview witnesses to build their arguments. Everyone gets a part in the trial and everyone's part is important. Mel is the judge so that he can keep the court proceedings moving and interject instruction in the legal processes. The outcome is a jury decision. Rare is the class which doesn't ask "Can we do it again?"



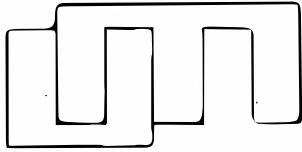

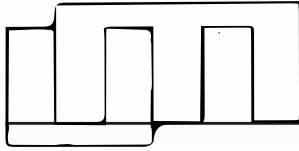

MR. MEL MILLER

Mel Miller caught it when he was only a freshman at St. Louis High School in Mt. Clemens. While it is highly contagious, it is not easily understood or often noticed. It causes no illness; yet catching it can greatly alter your life. What Mel Miller caught as a high school freshman was a whole lot of enthusiasm for teaching, for social studies and for liberty. Liberty means being free to grow and is a governing principle in our society and in Mr. Mel Miller.

Mel's inspiration was high school teacher Mr. John Labonish, a social studies teacher who came to be a model for Mel. Like Mr. Labonish did then, Mel Miller today brings social studies to life for his students. He spreads that still contagious enthusiasm and engages his students, through a variety of well organized activities, in the process of their own learning. He involves them, leads them on a journey of discovering and urges them to use their own reasoning, insights and investigative abilities to arrive at new understandings. He is a teacher who inspires both learning and the search for truth, like Socrates of ancient Athens. He does this in a field of study where opinions vary and confusing abstractions abound. That Mel teaches at the Middle School level, where so many students operate intellectually at concrete levels, makes his excellence as a teacher all the more remarkable.

Learning was not easy for Mel in his early years. Reading was difficult for him, and he painfully recalls being in the "low group" in elementary school and being taunted by more successful students. The struggle with learning that he encountered on his path to being salutatorian of his high school class and earning honors his senior year in college, have aided him in being an empathetic teacher today. He can identify with the students who have a hard time. He regularly asks himself, "How can I help them?" He does so by developing classroom projects and activities that provide choice and flexibility that do not lock students into their weak skill areas. The wide range of choices can draw upon art talents, graph making talents, dramatic abilities, ethnic cookery, construction ability and a host of skills in addition to reading and language. This flexibility in planning means that all students in his class receive encouragement and the means to achieve, thus building their self images and ultimately aiding their educational attainments. Mel compassionately plans for and meets the individual needs of his students.

Mel credits his mother with being a strong influence in his life. Mrs. Eleanor Miller was a very selfless and service oriented person. Mel recalls helping his mother, who was a VFW Chairperson for the Rehabilitation Committee, to prepare Thanksgiving food baskets and Christmas gifts for needy families. Mel today continues this kind of work and is also teaching the value of service to a new generation of youth at Middle School North. He sponsors the Junior National Honor Society, the service organization within the school that performs numerous charitable functions in this community.

Mel's interest in social studies and his willingness to serve his community led him to become active in politics. He campaigned for and met Robert Kennedy during the 1960's. While campaigning in a ghetto, Mel met people with little, who seemed quite happy. They were willing to give generously in support of their beliefs in an effort to improve our society. The same campaign led him to visit an affluent suburban community where the people he met were wealthy in the materialistic sense, yet less happy, much less generous, and seemingly entrapped by their values. Mel knew then

that service to his fellow man and personal enjoyment and fulfillment in life were riches more valuable than any materialistic wealth.

Mel, like his father, is a practical man. His dad, Mr. Irvin Miller, applies his practicality to solving mechanical, electrical and engineering problems. Mel applies his practicality to the tasks of teaching more effectively. He is a master of organization and time management. He is forever searching for ideas, activities and simulations that will improve the learning of his students, and he uses his insights and imagination to create new approaches. Mel's Dad recently applied for a patent on a heating system. Mel is currently preparing a pamphlet on time management and has shared numerous practical ideas with his colleagues through his writing and presentations at state and national conferences. Both Millers know how to effectively and efficiently get things done.

Social studies is a living experience for Mel. He shares this by giving his students the opportunity to experience it as well. They become travelers on a wagon train, or members of a legislative body. A "Millersville" Courtroom trial comes alive in his classroom with students in the roles of jury, attorneys and witnesses. A heritage project provides the experience of ethnic dress, food and a taste of strange wonderful cultures. On another occasion, a trading game takes place. Suddenly, secret rules, known only to a few players, become operational. The frustrating experience of trying hard and constantly losing becomes an experiential lesson in the effects of prejudice and discrimination. Social studies as taught by Mel Miller, is a living, thinking, feeling experience full of wonder, excitement and discovery.

Of his many personal qualities, Mel is above all respectful of others. Even Mel's brand of humor is characteristic of his respect for fellow man. Mel is a punster, a veritable master of the play on words. While his puns may sometimes be received with groans, the beauty of his humor is that a pun is humor without victim. Look at most humor and you will find a victim, an element of pain. Mel's humor is free of that; it's pure intellectual play and enjoyment. The respect that Mel gives to others earns respect in return. This is true in all of his relationships. He has a bumper sticker on his car which reads, "Kids are people, too!" and all his actions as an educator clearly acclaim this belief.

Mel Miller's motto is "Happiness is activity. It is a running stream, not a stagnant pool." He leads an active, happy life doing well work that he loves and values. He gives generously of himself - his contagious enthusiasm, his empathy, his insights, his skills and talents, his organizational ability, his intelligence, his research, his leadership, his appreciation for the varied richness of life, his love of learning, his respect, his patience, his humor, his time and energy in service to his fellow man - and Mel Miller thus enriches the lives of those around him. Mel Miller is himself a model of liberty and of what an outstanding educator should be - A MOST FITTING TEACHER OF THE YEAR!

" I have had the good fortune of choosing and being accepted in one of the noblest of professions --- the education of our youth. I originally made this choice years ago after experiencing the expertise and enthusiasm of my High School Social Studies teacher. He viewed education as a challenge to be met with the highest standards. I have attempted to carry on this idea of academic excellence by making my classes a meaningful experience for students. A main goal is that these students become efficient and effective citizens with an appreciation of their rich heritage. To attain this goal, I have tried to make the coursework come alive, celebrating student enthusiasm as a means toward the acquisition of the skills and knowledge needed to appreciate and succeed in life. I encourage students to develop and refine their thought processes with the realization that education is a never-ending process; never a final achievement."

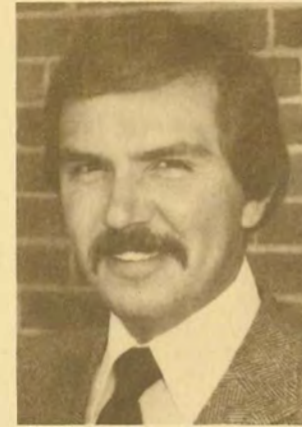

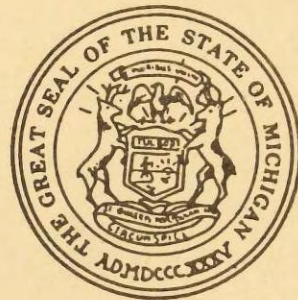

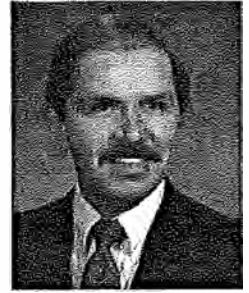

It's no surprise to St. Clair Shores teacher Diana Rybar that Mel Miller, social studies consultant of the Macomb Intermediate School District, is now the president-elect of the National Social Studies Supervisors' Association (NSSSA).

"He's a very dedicated educator who's not afraid to try things and who knows how to get students interested and involved in their courses," says the Harrison Elementary School second-grade teacher.

Rybar ought to know — she was a student of Miller when he taught American history at L'Anse Creuse Middle School North in Macomb Township and was Michigan Teacher of the Year.

"He was fabulous. He made the class come alive. He wasn't afraid to dress up and act as different characters in American history. I'll always remember the mock trial we had — he was the judge and the class members played the roles of attorneys and defendant and jury.

excellence in social studies education across the nation.

"That's important for promoting good citizenship," he says.

"There's a bright future for social studies. People are taking notice of its importance as our country and our world emerge."

He says students have become more world-minded in the 23 years he's been an educator.

"Today's students know far more about the world than previous generations," he says. "Social studies education has to keep pace by showing America as part of a global community."

He says the just-established core curriculum of Michigan features reading, writing, math, science, history, American government, geography and economics — "and four of the eight are social studies."

Miller says Macomb County's schools "are very good in social studies" with high involvement of teachers in MISD workshops on making the curriculum more relevant and exciting.

Miller himself contributed to the social studies curriculum of the county and state recently by developing a unit on China, complete with artifacts from the world's most populous country as a result of a study tour of that country last year.

Miller resides in the Romeo Community Schools district with his wife Patrice, library technician at Washington Elementary School, and daughters Sara, 13, eighth grade student at Romeo Junior High, and Courtney, 11, sixth grade student at Powell Middle School.

"He loves working with students and teachers, drawing out the best in them," says his wife. "He wants to help out with the future," says Sara.

A native of Mount Clemens, Miller graduated in 1967 from the former St. Louis High School where he was newspaper editor, junior class president, and salutatorian.

He earned his bachelor's degree in American history from the University of Michigan in 1971 where he worked on the university yearbook.

He taught in Illinois three years before landing a teaching job in his hometown area teaching social studies in the L'Anse Creuse district. Miller earned a master's degree in instructional technology from Wayne State University and nine years ago became a county social studies consultant.

The middle school concept received a dynamic boost with the announcement by the White House on April 14, 1982, that a middle school level teacher from Upper Arlington, Ohio, won the prestigious 1982 National Teacher of the Year Award.

And the good news does not stop there. It was also previously announced that three of the four na-

tional finalists for this year's award all taught at the middle school level. Middle school advocates are probably not surprised as we have known for a long time that it takes very special people to teach at this level. But it is especially pleasing to see such recognition bestowed on these teachers and the middle school concept we all believe in.

Middle school advocates can stand taller than ever now that our nation's premiere teacher recognition program has honored a middle school teacher as its winner and two of the other three finalists teach at the intermediate level.

Bruce Brombacher

The 1982 National Teacher of the Year is Bruce Brombacher, teacher at Jones Junior High School in the Upper Arlington School District of Ohio and a member of NMSA. In six years of teaching he has achieved remarkable results. His philosophy of education gives ample reason to see why he has been successful with middle school level youngsters. In his words:

"My philosophy of teaching can be stated very simply. I try to extend an invitation to learn to each student I meet every day... Everything about my students is important to me. I strive to be familiar with the student's home environment, family, friends, and activities outside the confines of the school so we may work together and grow within the educational setting. To me, teaching is not an eight to five job; rather, it is a twenty-four hour a day responsibility... I encourage exploration of and active participation in activities of personal relevance to the student. The use of the many resources within the home, community, and the school is encouraged. Yet none of this matters unless I personally invite all my students to become active participants in their own learning."



His superintendent says of this teacher:

"Bruce provides an appropriate mix of academic background and experience in business and industry to make learning come alive for eighth graders."

One parent noted:

"Volumes have been written about the need to individualize instruction. It is the school's largest problem. Apparently he has succeeded where others have failed."



Another parent says:

"Mr. Brombacher has that desirable quality of reaching all levels of learners in a classroom. He is challenging, demanding of the able learner and acutely aware and patient in his efforts to impart his subject to the slower learner."

The principal under whom Mr. Brombacher works makes these observations:

"Bruce is a great teacher and educator. In the short time that he has taught, he has had several opportunities to move into supervisory positions, but has chosen to stay in the classroom... Bruce could be anything that he wants to be. We, at Jones Junior High School, are glad he wants to be a teacher."



Bruce was instrumental in establishing the micro-computer program at his school.

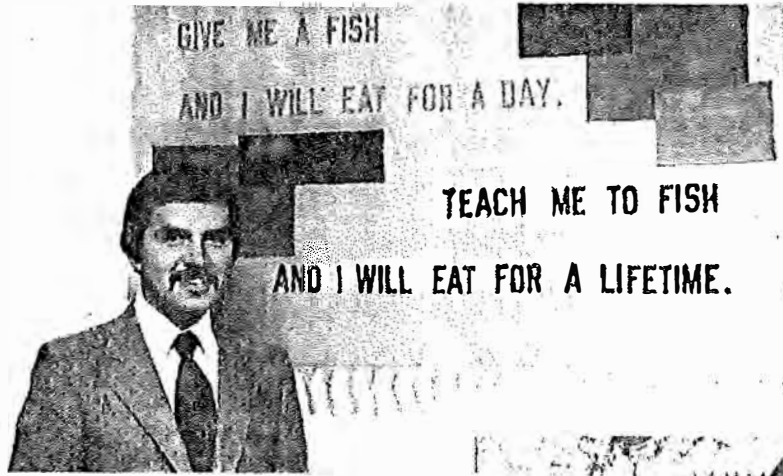


Mel Miller

A 1982 National Teacher of the Year Finalist, Mel Miller teaches social studies in the seventh and eighth grades at L'Anse Creuse Middle School, North, in Mt. Clemens, Michigan. Mel, who has been teaching eleven years, is an active member of the Michigan Middle School Association and NMSA.

Excerpts from his philosophy of education reveal why students find his classes both meaningful and significant.

"I have had the good fortune of choosing and being accepted in one of the noblest of professions — the education of our youth...A main goal is that these students become efficient and effective citizens with an appreciation of their rich heritage. To attain this goal, I have tried to make the course-work come alive, celebrating student enthusiasm as a means toward the acquisition of the skills and knowledge needed to appreciate and succeed in life. I encourage students to develop and refine their thought processes with the realization that education is a never-ending process, never a final achievement."



His Superintendent points out that:

"Mr. Miller always has several "irons in the fire" at the local and state levels in curriculum improvement. The results of his contributions to the L'Anse Creuse Schools, Macomb County and Michigan social studies will benefit students for years to come."

A former student reflects:

"I had Darlene as a teacher for five of the most "character building" years of my life and she probably did more for me in establishing roots for a career, whether it be art or anything else, than did my own will. She made a point saying that 'Whatever you choose to do with your life, if it is what you desire to achieve and are willing to work for, in success and in failure, you can do.' She was right."

David F. Bernard-Stevens

The last 1982 National Teacher of the Year Finalist; David F. Bernard-Stevens is a social studies teacher at the Papillion-LaVista Senior High School in Papillion, Nebraska. He has been teaching for five years.

Excerpts from his philosophy of education reveal his commitment to the larger, long-term goals of education.

"Teaching is much more than just another honorable profession. It is no less than the educating of society's young so that they may carry on and improve upon the traditions, goals, cultural customs, and moral spirit — those things that constitute the basic heart of a society's future. . . We must teach our young to use existing knowledge while being prepared to reshape that knowledge and, in some cases, throw out that which has become outdated. Finally, it is important to give students

positive self-images and to push them to understand their tremendous potential as human beings. Once this is accomplished, students will grow in their confidence and ability to meet new challenges as if they, too, were being dared to succeed."

Mr. Bernard-Stevens' principal says of him:

"He is innovative and dynamic in the classroom, infusing his students with tremendous motivation and instilling in them an appetite for the joys of learning."

A parent describes his ability to be both friend and teacher:

"It is an extremely difficult task for a teacher to be a true friend with his/her students and yet retain the separation required to be a superior teacher. Never have I known a teacher better able to handle this delicate balance than Mr. Bernard-

Stevens. . . If all teachers were as conscientious and constructive as he, our educational opportunities would be unequaled anywhere in the world."

A student describes him in glowing terms:

"He has always been more than an instructor, rather, he has been an educator. . . Unlike many popular high school teachers, Mr. Bernard-Stevens is tough. His Economics course is reputed to be the hardest, most demanding class at Papillion,

Having been in it, I can only agree. He is completely fair, always willing to spend his free time with students, and highly respected by both faculty and the student body. Mr. Bernard-Stevens epitomizes the very best of the modern American Educator."

The annual National Teacher of the Year Awards Program, sponsored by the Council of Chief State School Officers, the Encyclopaedia Britannica Companies, and *Good Housekeeping* magazine, is not so much a program to select "the best teacher" as it is a way of honoring one who exemplifies the best in teaching thereby bringing honor to all teachers. Numerous criteria are used in evaluating the persons nominated, but the most important is the ability to inspire love of learning in students of all backgrounds and abilities. A packet of information that includes directions on how to place a teacher's name in nomination is mailed to all chief state school officers in the Spring from the Council.

A portfolio of materials documenting the candidate's qualifications is assembled by the school and submitted to the state education agency. These portfolios are evaluated by the state selection committee and one teacher is chosen to represent the state.

In the fall the portfolios of the state teachers are submitted to the national program in Washington, D.C. The name of the new National Teacher of the year is announced at a White House ceremony early in the Spring.

Bruce Brombacher of Jones Junior High School in Upper Arlington, Ohio, triumphed over all the other state winners in a national program cosponsored by the Council of Chief State School Offices, Encyclopaedia Britannica, and Good Housekeeping

Eight years ago Bruce Brombacher made a decision that changed his life. Back then he was working for American Oil Company and taking courses to complete his doctorate in science. Then, he suddenly decided to abandon that road and take up a new one: He would become a teacher.

Many were surprised at the career change, but to Bruce it was not so much a change as a return to his first love. For he had been a teacher of sorts since he was nine years old. When a fourth-grade student needed help with a spelling test, young Bruce pitched in to help. He not only taught his classmate to spell, he also convinced him that he could spell. The fourth-grade teacher was so impressed she made Bruce a tutor. He worked with students through the rest of his grammar and high school years, at camp during summers, and at college to earn extra money. In Vietnam, where he served as an M.P. after being drafted, he taught Vietnamese children English. But once back from Vietnam, he gave up teaching to pursue a science career. Why?

Today, Bruce says that he was a shy student who did what he was supposed to do. His high school guidance counselor told him that he had great ability in science (he had walked off with most of his school's

science awards), and that he should go into science. "No one ever asked me what I wanted to do," says Bruce, "so I did what I was supposed to do."

"I wasn't completely happy, though. I was lonely doing research in a lab." It was at that point that he made a career change: He became a teacher.

It was a big decision not only for him but for his wife, Marcia, also a teacher, and for the two children they were later to have. But those who benefited the most by the switch are and were the students Bruce has taught over the years.

To the students of his present math classes, Bruce is "the greatest." Says one student, "Any teacher who can convince junior high students that if they can divide a pizza they can learn math—well, that teacher is way out front."

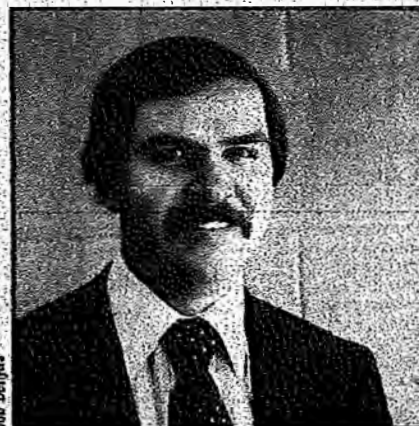

of pizzas, so does he believe that electronics belong in the everyday world of learning. Unlike others, he does not believe that calculators will make lazy children. He even encourages the use of calculators, saying, "Think of the time it saves for students to be working on something else." He has set up a computer program, complete with lab, at Jones Junior High. The lab has been used as a model throughout

Ohio. He conducts workshops, writes articles, and speaks to teacher groups all over the world about the value of computers.

Eight years ago Kevin Ryan, a professor of education at Ohio State University, conducted a study of first-year teachers. Bruce was part of that study.

Says Ryan, "At the beginning of the year's study, Bruce looked like all the others, but then he just took off and rose above the crowd." Teachers tend to follow what Ryan calls "a curve of disappointment and self-doubt" during that first year, but Bruce's curve never went down.

But of all the people we talked to about 1982's Teacher of the Year, the principal of Jones High summed up Bruce Brombacher best: "Bruce can be anything he wants. We at Jones Junior High are glad he wants to be a teacher."

The Other Three Finalists
DAVID BERNARD-STEVENS (*Nebraska state winner*). Wander into one of David Bernard-Stevens's classes and you might hear a mock senatorial battle over the SALT II treaty, or a congressional debate on funds for NASA. David Bernard-Stevens is one of the rare breed who teaches his American government and economics students to learn by doing, because that's exactly how he learned.

Back in college one of David's government classes was taught by a professor who invited a U.S. senator's assistant to address the students. Months later the guest speaker declared himself a candidate for Congress, and David pitched in to help with the campaign—which was successful.

The following year David met

another senator who steered him to Washington and a job in the office of the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate. Three years later David returned to Nebraska with a background that made him uniquely qualified to teach American government and economics to Nebraska's high school students.

He teaches his students to gather facts, to analyze them, to form opinions based on them, and to fight opposition intelligently by anticipating arguments.

He applies the same technique to problem-solving in his own life, whether he is saving the school reading program through an organized campaign or winning over those who doubted his teaching methods, or averting marital problems when he wed physician Janet Bernard by combining both their names with a hyphen.

—David opens his students' minds, but says one student, "You can never have peace of mind again." Peace of mind, says David Bernard-Stevens, is not the gain of thinkers. And peace of mind is definitely *not* what David Bernard-Stevens is all about.

MELVIN MILLER (*Michigan state winner*). Learning was not always fun for Mel Miller. As a child, he had difficulty reading and spelling and consequently suffered the pain of his classmates' jibes and his teachers' frustration. Through sheer will-power and long hours of extra work he overcame his weaknesses, graduated second highest in his high school class, and went on to earn first a college degree and the master's degree.

Perhaps it was his childhood problem that makes Mel Miller the marvelous man and teacher he is today. He identifies completely with his students and they with him; his success offers them real hope for personal goals. Quietly, Mel Miller is their inspiration.

Mel makes social studies step out of the pages of the textbooks and come alive for the seventh and eighth graders who can't wait to get to class in the morning. "It's such fun you don't even know you're learning," is how one student explained it to me.

And Mel's inspiration goes beyond the classroom. He runs a workshop on stress management for teachers, writes and directs faculty plays, plants flowers for the school, organizes fund raisers, and singlehandedly turned the Michigan Council on Social Studies into a nationwide event.

With all this outpouring of creative energy will Mel Miller "burn out?" "NO!" he says, adding, "But if I ever do, it will be one's fault but my own."

DARLENE FRAZIER (*Iowa state winner*). All around the town of Boone, a visitor will find testimony to Darlene Frazier and her art-class student. The town vibrates with their artwork: a 50-foot mural in midtown, a mosaic on the wall of the Chamber of Commerce, pen-and-ink drawings in the optometrist's office, mosaic sacrosanct on the front of the school, sculpture, batik, and architectural designs in the homes of family and friends throughout the community. Even some of the road signs are her student's handiwork.

To Darlene Frazier, art is not mere decoration, it is the key that opens doors for young people. Through art, her students find self-expression and outlet—and even a career.

With such a valuable key in her possession, Darlene strives to extend its use throughout the whole community.

When her effort to add art to the elementary-school curriculum failed because there were no funds to hire additional art teachers, she came up with the solution: Instruct classroom teachers to teach art. Her plan was accepted; she was the instructor who "taught" the teachers, and now Boone's little children are artists too.

Darlene defines one of her own goals as "making misfits fit." Each day as students crowd into her room, exchanging the competitive stress of school for the individual fulfillment of creativity, she knows her goal is at hand. ★

HOW THE WINNERS ARE SELECTED

Every year, students, teachers, and school administrators nominate individuals to be their State Teacher of the Year. The winner of each state (or territory) subsequently becomes a candidate for National Teacher of the Year. Then, representatives from leading educational organizations study the state winners and select four finalists based on their contributions to their students, schools, and their communities. The finalists are visited in person, and

reports and videotapes are presented to the judges, who then make the final choice.

Each spring the President of the United States honors the National Teacher of the Year in a special ceremony at the White House. In mid-April, when President Reagan presents Bruce Brombacher with his trophy, it will be the thirty-first such presentation. Appropriately, the trophy is a crystal apple.

The cosponsors of this program—The Council of Chief State

School Officers, Encyclopaedia Britannica, and *Good Housekeeping*—are proud to spotlight

the nation's superteachers. These individuals are outstanding in their own right and also represent the many, many fine teachers who can be found in schools all across the country.

Teacher of the Year: Mel Miller

MOUNT CLEMENS—To Mel Miller, Michigan's "teacher of the Year," the classroom teacher must preach the job in three ways: As an instructor, an actor and a clown.

And outside the classroom, Miller sees his role as that of an interested friend to his young pupils at Anse Creuse Middle School North.

The complicated blend has proved successful to Miller, and after 11 years as a classroom teacher, he has been given top teaching honors in a program sponsored by the Michigan Department of Education. **STATE SCHOOLS** Superintendent Dr. Phillip Inkel will be in the L'Anse Creuse School District Tuesday, Dec. 3, to officially announce Miller's award.

Miller, 32, a social studies teacher at the middle school, was selected from teachers throughout the state, based on his past career, activities and commendations of other educators.

Miller said he likes to take a "hands on" approach in teaching social studies; to involve his students the subject of study as much as possible.

During a unit of study on the American Revolution, Miller dons the costume of a Revolutionary War soldier. He also brings artifacts from the same time period that he has collected for the student to see.

"YOU'VE GOT to be enthused as a teacher," Miller said. "You've got to turn the kids on, and one way is to really bring the aspects of the period we're studying into the classroom. It's more understandable for the kids than just reading a book."

Earlier this week, Miller involved his seventh grade students in an exercise designed to allow them to experience first-hand the decisions made during the colonization of America in the 1600s.

The children were given the names and occupations of 15 people who had been given preliminary clearance to colonize a planet very much like Earth. The year is about 2070 AD.

INCLUDED IN the group are a doctor, farmer, ecologist, millionaire sportsman, high school English teacher and a concert violinist.

The children were asked to form small study groups and decide which 10 of the 15 candidates would be sent to the planet.

Sheri Bedker, Cathy Wilson and Darlene Williamson, all 12, quickly decided that the doctor, the farmer, a teacher, violinist, a surveyor and an auto mechanic were among the candidates to be selected. Eliminated from consideration were the millionaire, a journalist, dietician and an electronics engineer.

During the group discussions, Miller made comparisons of the students' choices to those which would have to be made by the Colonists in order to survive.

"HE'S A pretty good teacher," Sheri said of Miller. "We do a lot of games and things. It's not just boring old social studies here."

When the class studied American Indians earlier this year, Miller taught them about games the Indians played, Sheri explained.

Miller said he attempts to know each of his students individually. One way he does it is by having the students complete a questionnaire.

"Some of the questions are rather trivial, like, 'what's your favorite color,' but others are more serious, like, 'what do you like best and least about yourself,'" Miller said.

HE ALSO has the students write a paragraph explaining what they want Miller to know about them.

"They tell me things about themselves that can really help me deal better with them," Miller said. "Of course, I don't always hit 100 percent, but I try as much as possible."

Miller said perhaps one of the reasons for his success as a teacher is his priorities.

"My family comes first, and my teaching is second," Miller said.

He said his wife, Patrice, a library clerk who is now on leave from the Rochester Schools, deserves much of the credit for his award.

"I really appreciate her," Miller said. "If I need time to prepare something for the class, she'll take over with our baby so I can get the work done."

THE COUPLE has a pre-school daughter and expect a second child in March.

Miller's professional career was put on hold last spring, when he received his layoff notice after eight years with the district. Voters had turned down a request for new millage, and nearly one-third of the district's staff was pink-slipped, he said.

He was called back later in the year and assigned to teach at the Macomb County Jail, but when voters OK'd the new millage in a second vote, Miller's job at the middle school was restored to him.

"I WAS happy about it," he admits. "You can do so many neat things with seventh and eighth graders."

Despite his success, Miller says he doesn't consider himself as the state's best teacher.

"I didn't expect to win the state competition, and I wouldn't have minded," Miller said. "Just being nominated by my peers (at the building) was enough."

"I'm planning to accept this award on behalf of all the good teachers in the state, and there are many. I think the award will highlight some of the good things that are going on in education—especially the teachers in the classroom."

As the state winner, Miller is representing Michigan in a national competition to be held in Washington, D.C. The winner will be announced in the spring.

State Board newsbriefs

At its November 3-4 meeting the State Board of Education approved the distribution of \$1,374,260 in State Aid to the 22 Regional Educational Media Centers for 1981-82 operations. Each center receives \$17,500 plus a per capita allotment. Total allocations to the centers range from \$22,332 to \$260,655.

Special activity grants totaling \$25,740 to continue successful projects from last year in the Saginaw and Calhoun intermediate school districts also were approved.

The Board approved the 1982 Statewide Hispanic Education Conference and Awards Banquet to be held in the spring. More than 25 organizations will be involved in the conference and banquet. The purpose will be to provide a series of presentations on issues affecting the educational opportunities of Hispanics and to continue the tradition of recognizing the educational and community service achievements

Taylor schools to be studied

The State Board of Education will make a comprehensive study of the Taylor Public Schools to help the financially-troubled Wayne County school district reduce costs and at the same time improve its instructional programs.

State Superintendent Phillip E. Runkel said Taylor school officials asked the State Board to conduct a review of the district.

The study will be similar to the one conducted earlier this year in Pontiac. The six-week study of the Pontiac schools was the most comprehensive review of a local school district's academic programs and budget and expenditure procedures ever conducted by the Department staff, Runkel said.

A 115-page Pontiac report contained 150 specific recommendations, including 60 in the area of financial admini-

of Michigan's Hispanic population.

Federal grants totaling \$104,901 were awarded by the Board to 12 school districts for basic skills and computer programs. Grants totaling \$72,402 were awarded to eight school districts for basic skills improvement programs and grants totaling \$32,499 were awarded to the Genesee, Macomb and Marquette-Alger intermediate school districts for computer services. The eight districts are Dearborn, Delta-Schoolcraft and St. Clair Intermediates, Hamtramck, Ontonagon, Saginaw, Williamston, and Willow Run. Detroit received four grants totaling \$27,243.

The Board amended the Nutrition Education and Training grant award to the Bay-Arenac Intermediate School District for 1981-82 from \$40,211 to \$43,994.

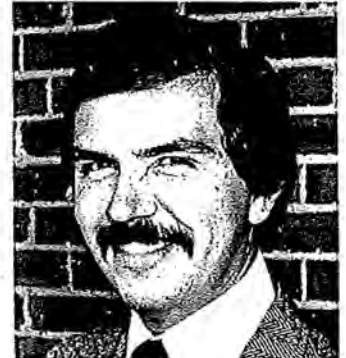
The Pontiac schools have adopted many of the recommendations.

Runkel said he has asked the Taylor Board of Education to implement as many of the recommendations to be made by the State Board Task Force as possible.

"It is essential for the Taylor Board of Education to adopt the recommendations that we make if it hopes to close the credibility gap that exists between the schools and many of the taxpayers in Taylor," the State Schools Superintendent said.

The Taylor Public Schools, which have an estimated 17,000 students, is Michigan's eleventh largest school district.

Runkel said Deputy State Superintendent of Public Instruction Eugene T. Paslov and Assistant Superintendent John Dobbs will serve as co-chairmen of the State Board Task Force that will conduct the review of Taylor's academic programs and business practices. The study should be completed by late January.



L'Anse Creuse man is Teacher of Year

A Macomb County teacher who had difficulty with reading when he was a child is Michigan's 1981-82 Teacher of the Year.

Melvin A. Miller, who teaches seventh and eighth grade social studies at L'Anse Creuse Middle School North in Mt. Clemens, was chosen from among 20 outstanding teachers from throughout Michigan who were nominated for the honor.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip E. Runkel called Miller Nov. 12 to notify him that he had been chosen as "Teacher of the Year."

"At first, he didn't believe it but I finally was able to convince him that I wasn't kidding," Runkel said. "I could just feel the excitement at the other end of the line as he realized that he had been selected."

"Michigan can be proud of its new Teacher of the Year. He is an excellent representative of all of Michigan's good teachers."

Nancy Helsel, a second grade teacher in Kent City Community Schools, was the runner-up. Eighteen other finalists were named.

Joan Hammersmith, a first grade teacher in the Forest Hills (Kent County) District was Teacher of the Year in 1980-81.

Miller, who lives in the Macomb County community of Washington, said he decided he wanted to be a teacher when he was a freshman at St. Louis High School in Mt. Clemens in the mid-1960's.

"One of my high school teachers — John Labnish — was my inspiration," Miller said. "He turned me on to teaching and that became my goal during the years I was in high school and college."

A native Detroitier who moved to Macomb County before he started school, Miller said that learning was not easy for him in his early years.

"Reading was difficult for me and I recall being in the 'low group' in elementary school and being taunted by some of the more successful students," he said.

But he went on to become an honor student in high school and college.

Miller said he wanted to teach high school but no openings were available when he was hired by the L'Anse Creuse district eight years ago after teaching for three years in Wonder Lake, Illinois. So he accepted a position as a junior high school teacher.

"Junior high school students are a real challenge. I've enjoyed teaching the seventh and eighth grade more than I thought I would because the students are so responsive. These are their 'molding' years. For that reason I feel that I can have a greater impact on their lives than I would if they were high school students."

Miller graduated from the University of Michigan in 1971 and received a master's degree from Wayne State University in 1977.

The Michigan Teacher of the Year Program is sponsored by the State Board of Education, the Michigan Congress of Parents, Teachers and Students, Michigan Association of School Boards, the Michigan Association of School Administrators, the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals, the Michigan Association of Middle School Educators, the Retirement Coordinating Council for Michigan Public School Employees, the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, the Michigan Elementary and Middle School Principals Association and the Michigan Federation of Teachers.

Legislative Notes

The State Board of Education has adopted a position of "support concept" on legislation introduced by State Rep. Juanita Watkins (D-Detroit) to require due process hearing procedures for students who are suspended or expelled from school.

House Bill 4398 was reported to the floor of the House of Representatives on Nov. 2 and was scheduled for debate on Nov. 24. The bill constitutes a bipartisan compromise and differs considerably from the original measure. The major provisions are:

- School boards would be required to adopt pupil codes of conduct. The codes would need to be verified by the Department of Education as containing certain basic components including — statements of rights and responsibilities — identification of misconduct for which disciplinary action may be imposed — existing attendance policies — due process procedures for suspending, expelling or excluding a student from a classroom or activity — and procedures for parents and/or pupils to use in appealing decisions. As is currently the case, schools would retain the right to suspend or expel a student found to be guilty of "gross

Accredited

In 1979, the Lansing School District's Adult Education Program was accredited by the North Central Accreditation Association.

It is the only Michigan adult education program accredited by North Central. The State Board's Adult Education and Extended Learning unit commends Lansing for this achievement and encourages other school districts to follow suit.

The Lansing district currently is conducting a self-evaluation of its adult education program, which is headed by Lee Mason of Lansing.

The program demands that adult students be served with excellence and with programs that address the needs of adults who not only return to complete their education, but also to find a better life, reports Ronald Gillum, acting deputy director of the Adult Extended Learning Services.

The district has incorporated the Life Role Competencies formulated by the Department into the adult education classroom on a daily basis and has developed curriculum materials in career development.

The State Board of Education's basic state plan and long-range program for providing services to Michigan libraries under the federal Library Services and Construction Act is available for public review. It spells out the services the State Library will provide to the blind and physically handicapped, state institutions, public libraries and areas without adequate public library services for a five-year period.

misdemeanor" or "persistent disobedience" and to determine those student actions which might fall under either of these terms.

• The Department would be mandated to develop and distribute to schools a model code of pupil conduct for them to use in developing their own codes.

• Minimum due process hearing and appeal procedures similar to those required by the United States Supreme Court are included in the bill.

• Schools that are required to offer bilingual education programs would be mandated to provide a copy of the local pupil code of conduct in the language or languages of the bilingual program.

• The State Board of Education would be required to devise and distribute to schools a form for collecting statistical data on pupil suspension and expulsion and to report the results to the Legislature.

• Language would be added to Section 1311 of the State School Code if this bill becomes law, to ensure that a special education student is not suspended or expelled without being afforded all procedural safeguards guaranteed by laws and rules governing mandatory special education.

The State Board supports the concept of schools having uniform due process procedures for students facing suspension or expulsion, as well as the involvement of students, parents, and school personnel in developing local student codes of conduct, a cooperative effort which this bill would assure.

With the assistance of representative organizations, the Department is nearing completion of a revised "Recommended Guide to Student Rights and Responsibilities." This booklet has not been revised since its initial development in the early 70's, and together with a "Model Code of Pupil Conduct" should prove to be of great assistance to school communities in adopting local codes.

The Michigan House of Representatives and the Senate have passed separate pieces of legislation that deal with the concept of "truth-in-taxation." The legislation is designed to "inform" the public that property taxes are levied, collected and spent at the local level.

Under the bills, school districts and other local units of government could not raise property taxes due to increases in state equalized valuations until a public hearing is held and the governing body votes to accept the increase.

Attorney General opinions:

No. 5999 — The governing body of a city may not refuse the request of the board of trustees of a community college district to collect community college taxes in the summer if the city collects its taxes in the summer. The board of trustees of a community college district may not request a township to make a summer tax collection for the college.



Easy to see why he's a top teacher

Michigan's teacher of the year received his layoff notice in April.

Voters in the L'Anse Creuse district rejected a school tax increase, so Melvin Miller, despite eight years' experience, was given a pink slip.

Four months later, residents of the Macomb County district reversed their stand and approved the tax hike. For Miller, it meant a return to social studies classes.

For students at Middle School North, it meant the return of a superb instructor.

Miller, who sometimes wears a colonial-era costume to teach American history, was recently named Michigan's top teacher in a contest sponsored

by 11 statewide education organizations.

One visit to Miller's seventh and eighth grade history classes shows why he was selected for the honor.

They appear to be typical middle school classes, with green cinderblock walls, student notes furtively making their way across the room and 12-year-olds opting for segregation by sex.

The instruction, however, is far from routine. Students learn about political parties by dividing into parties of their own, selecting candidates and directing campaigns. Some

eighth graders choose "No teachers over 30" as their platform, but rule it out when they realize that would mean the loss of the 32-year-old Miller.

"HE TALKS to us like we're people, not just little kids," says eighth grader Janice Janostak. "A lot of teachers talk down to you, but not Mr. Miller."

"He's not boring like some other teachers," adds classmate Chris Pauli. "He gets involved and tries to make things exciting. Sometimes he even cracks jokes."

Miller's involvement includes advising the National Honor Society, serving on the

school's staff development committee and teaching class in costume relating to the lesson. "I was going to wear my witch's outfit today," he tells students before a lecture on the Salem trials, "but I couldn't make myself ugly enough."

Miller says: "A lot of people think the average teacher doesn't work very hard. What they don't realize is that in addition to the time we spend here, most of us spend two or three hours a night grading homework or planning lessons. It's hard work."

MILLER WAS selected over 24 other candidates for the state teacher of the year honor.

The award, according to Michigan Education Department spokesman Tom Farrell, is "rather informal and not decided by any kind of exhaustive study." Each of two dozen districts nominates a candidate, who sends a resume and an "educational philosophy" paper to contest judges.

Miller may have ended up on top because he started near the bottom. As a child, he had to overcome severe reading problems that had placed him in a low academic track.

"I had a few teachers who inspired me to overcome that and make something of myself," he says. "That's one reason I decided to teach. I wanted

to pass on the lesson that if you work hard, you can overcome your difficulties."

Pride makes perfect

State's No. 1 teacher 'gets kids enthused' first

Melvin Miller, a seventh grade social-studies instructor who sometimes teaches American history while dressed in Colonial garb, yesterday was named Michigan's Teacher of the Year.

Miller, 31, who teaches at Middle School North in Macomb County's L'Anse Creuse district, is noted for his unique approach to learning and ability to "bring history alive." He was selected from about two dozen nominees statewide, and will represent Michigan as a candidate for national Teacher of the Year.

Nancy Helsel, a second-grade teacher in Kent City Community Schools, was the runner-up.

A teacher for 10 years, seven of them in the L'Anse Creuse district, Miller was nominated by the district because of what officials there term his dedication to the profession and hard work at the school.

"HE STRIVES to do an excellent job," said Bernard Cunningham, assistant principal of Middle School North. "He prides himself on offering a service to others. If there is such a thing as a perfect teacher, then he's it."

Cunningham said Miller works after hours, takes charge of the audio visual equipment, advises the National Honor Society and holds memberships in a number of teaching organizations, including the National Council for Social Studies.

Miller, a resident of Washington, a small community in northwestern Macomb County, has also written four educational plays that were staged for the student body by faculty members. But Cunningham said Miller's greatest contribution is his ability to hold the attention of the seventh and eighth grade students.

"You won't find a student of his who doesn't enjoy his social studies classes," he said.

MILLER'S social studies classes are a mix of teaching, workshops and skits, including mock sessions of Congress and court trials. Using about 600 photos taken on a vacation two years ago, Miller shows his students the different areas they are studying. He also brings artifacts to class and, on occasion, will dress in an old-fashion garment to show his class how the subjects of their study used to dress.

"I have a philosophy that first you have to get kids enthused. Then you can sneak in bits of information," he said.

Miller says he doesn't believe in always teaching out of the book because he is trying to captivate students and reach the students who have difficulties reading. He said he identifies with students with reading problems because he had similar problems when he was a child.

"ALL THROUGH elementary school I was in a low group and it bothered me," he said. "In high school I decided that if I was going to make anything of myself, I would have to do it on my own."

Miller graduated from St. Louis High School in Mt. Clemens, where he was salutatorian of the class. In 1971, he graduated from the University of Michigan and he earned a master's degree from Wayne State University in 1977.

While the much-liked and respected seventh-eighth grade social studies teacher was taken aback, his students and fellow staffers have long thought him a most dedicated instructor.

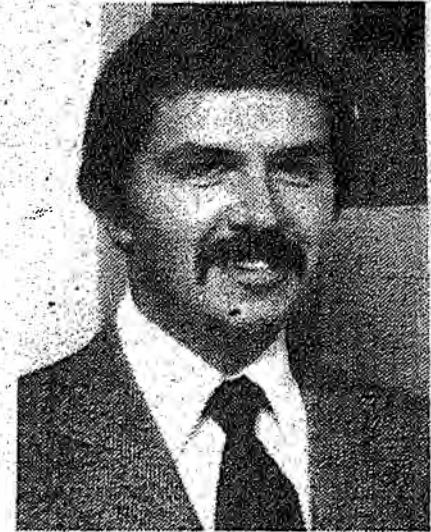
"Mel's done an outstanding job during his eight years here," Dooley noted. "He's contributed so much to our profession."

social studies in northern Illinois for three years. A 1971 graduate of the University of Michigan, he earned his masters degree from Wayne State University in 1977.

As a child, Miller had great difficulty in reading, a problem he feels made him a more compassionate teacher.

"I identify with the student who's having a hard time in class," he said. "I can encourage him or her."

Miller says his classes are "living social studies," with the students participating in projects rather than just reading and listening to lectures.

"We've held a mock congress, mock elections, archeological digs, explorers' projects and a wagon train simulation to help students really understand how things work," he said.

In addition to classroom work, Miller has sponsored the National

Junior Honor Society for many years, worked with the Michigan Council for Social Studies and the U. of M. Education Alumni Association.

He served as president of the Michigan Council for Social Studies, editor of the MCSS newsletter and was the recipient of the 1980 Hilda Maehling NEA Fellowship. He is a finalist for the service award of the National Council of Social Studies, to be presented next week in Detroit.

"This year includes the high and low point of my professional career," he said. The low point came some months ago when he was laid off after the district's millage defeat. When the millage was approved, he was able to keep his job in the classroom.

"The high point was being named Teacher of the Year," he smiled. "It didn't sink in until I called my wife, Patrice, who's currently on maternity leave from her library job in the Rochester

Schools.

"When I told her, she cried. Then I had to wipe my tears."

The Millers have a one-year-old daughter, Sara Beth, and are expecting another child in mid-March. The family resides in Washington Township.

Mr. Mel Miller began his employment in L'Anse Creuse twelve years ago in the fall of 1974. I have known Mr. Miller since 1979. He is an outstanding young man, an exceptional teacher and is doing an excellent job as the Educational Consultant for the Macomb Intermediate School District in the area of Social Studies. Mr. Miller has been a source of great inspiration for the entire L'Anse Creuse school district. During the 1981 - 82 school year, Mr. Miller was named the Michigan Teacher of the Year. There are 581 school districts in the State of Michigan and L'Anse Creuse was filled with joy when one of its teachers was so honored. Later that year he was named the first runner-up for the National Teacher of the Year; to be second in the entire United States needs no additional comment.

If I were to list the many accomplishments of Mr. Miller, it would require a ream of paper. Therefore I have elected to mention only a few of his accomplishments.

Mr. Miller currently serves all twenty-one school districts in Macomb County in the area of Social Studies. In this capacity he deals with classroom teachers, administrators and parents. He has helped a number of school districts complete K-12 Curriculum Reviews and Revisions in Social Studies.

Mr. Miller is a highly motivated teacher and he has that particular skill to teach other teachers how to motivate students through using a multiplicity of methodologies.

Mel has presented a number of workshops in the area of Time Management, Social Study Updates, Peace Education, Mastering Michigan and other topics.

He has facilitated workshops in the area of Mini-Society Elementary Economics, Energy Education and Aggressive Study Skills.

Mr. Miller has been very active in the S.C.O.P.E. Program, (Student Commission on Public Education), for Macomb County for the past three years. He has worked with student leaders from all the high schools in Macomb County and only recently he received a Michigan Department of Education Sex Equity Grant that was awarded to Mr. Miller for an intensive program dealing with non-traditional career choices for students. He has presented to a number of state and local conferences on this topic.

Mel has also been the county coordinator for the United States Senate Youth Scholarship Competition. This current year two of Mel's nominees were in the top 23 finalists with one winning one of the \$2000 State Scholarships.

Mel has been the county coordinator for two years for Close-Up: Washington D.C. Government Studies Program. Last year sixty-five students and nineteen adults participated, and this year the participation will grow to well over a hundred. The Macomb County Board of Commissioners have already agreed to grant a \$2000 monetary support for the Washington D.C. program.

Mel has served on the State Planning Committee for the Law-Related Educational State Conference. He also received a small incentive grant to promote Law-Related Education in the county.

Mel co-chairs the Macomb County Tax Education Curriculum Committee, and this year the committee is developing a pilot program to teach high school seniors about the basics of our local tax structure.

Mel was instrumental in developing the plan of bringing together the High School Social Studies Chairpersons on a regular basis to share ideas and concerns. This has received high praise from many Assistant Superintendents and Superintendents throughout the county.

Mr. Miller has worked on a number of state-level programs in the area of Social Studies. Some of these include: facilitating regional Curriculum and Instructional Program Improvement Workshops, and he has worked directly with members of Dr. Runkel's immediate staff to provide special assistance to Student Advisory Councils.







**L'Anse Creuse Public Schools Hall of Distinction
Nominees' Personal Professional Statement**

Cynthia Ann Morgan Broad was born and raised in Toledo, Ohio. She was the third child born into the Morgan family. Her Mom was a second grade teacher in the Toledo Public School system and her Dad moved his way up to vice-president of the Libby Owens Ford Glass company. In the Teacher of the Year booklet, Cindy wrote, "I decided to enter the teaching profession in the seventh grade after my younger brother (*born 10 years after me*) was diagnosed as having infantile autism. Autism was such an unknown handicap in 1959, there were few programs or teachers to help my brother. I realized then that I wanted to teach handicapped students to reach their potential."

Cindy's Mom decided to quit her teaching position and she set up a classroom in their home to educate Philip. When Cindy would come home from school, she would regularly take Philip to a park to help her Mom and to provide a different venue and experience for Philip. Thus began the teaching career of one empathetic, caring, resourceful, dedicated, and outstanding educator.

A. Profile the contributions to L'Anse Creuse Public Schools. Present your specific contributions. How did they support a fulfilling education for your students?

Throughout my 46 years teaching special needs students, I committed myself to constantly improving my teaching skills and knowledge, conducting teacher training workshops, developing innovative curriculums, mentoring other educators, while dedicating my career to utilizing every available resource to help my students overcome their challenges. Many of my students have placed out of special education and some have completed post high school trade programs or graduated from college. The professional awards I have received reflect the hard-earned success of my students and public recognition of my colleagues and L'Anse Creuse Public Schools.

B. Why did you choose to become involved with the district?

I met Mr. Ray Brooks, a L'Anse Creuse Principal at the time, at Bowling Green State University. He urged and invited me to visit L'Anse Creuse and interview with Dr. Hal Siebert and Harry Wheeler. I accepted and met with teachers in their classrooms and was impressed with their enthusiasm and dedication. L'Anse Creuse was a young, growing, and innovative district. I saw opportunity and support to apply my vision for bringing special education and regular education together. I could not have anticipated that nearly 20 years later, (September 20, 1989) the *Detroit Free Press* would quote me as Michigan Teacher of the Year saying: "My dream is that special ed. and regular ed. will be the same."

C. What led you to contribute above and beyond expected requirements of your position?

I was motivated throughout my career by the positive reception I experienced from fellow teachers, administration, parents, as well as the inspiring growth and success of my students. These were my rewards that compelled my dedication and devotion. I possessed a relentless drive to improve my teaching skills as well as a “never give up” belief in my students’ ability to overcome their challenges. I never felt alone in that task because of encouragement and support from my fellow teachers and the principals that believed in me. My students received a welcome boost of esteem whenever Superintendents Fred Pankow, Frank Higgins, Special Education Directors Hal Siebert or Dan Sapp would visit my classroom. A special visit from Michigan’s First Lady Janet Blanchard to my classroom was also an inspiring event.

“I have never regretted my decision to become a teacher, and especially a special education teacher. There is no feeling equal to the one I experience as I see my students reach new heights and gain confidence to achieve even more. It is an exciting, exhilarating experience.” A quote taken by the nominating committee from Mrs. Broad’s writing in the Teacher of the Year packet.

Summary

You have heard from Cindy in her own words in response to the above three questions. We, her nominating fellows, want to add a few additional things as Mrs. Broad is reticent to “toot her own horn.” At Cindy’s retirement party hosted by colleagues, Diane Vigneron stated that “*We have to find another way!*” could be her mantra throughout her teaching career. Whenever she or a colleague, either a special ed. teacher or general ed. teacher, experienced difficulty in helping to meet a student’s need to move forward, her response would be, “We have to find another way!”

The thinking behind that statement most likely began years ago when her family was assessing options for Philip long term and Cindy was considering moving to Michigan. Her Dad asked, “What can we do for Philip?” and Cindy’s response was, “I don’t know, but *we have to find a way!*” The result of that statement was Bittersweet Farms in Whitehouse, Ohio. The family researched options, sought funding and support, and worked diligently with help from others to buy land and build a residential home for individuals with autism. Today Bittersweet Farms offers both day and residential programs and provides work experiences for them. <https://www.bittersweetfarms.org>

Other programs resulted from the mantra, “We have to find a way!” One such program started in 1978 while working at Green Elementary. Mrs. Broad, always looking for a new technique to work with her students, approached the Telephone Pioneers of America about creating and donating a talking stuffed animal. The result was George, the talking bear, who helps teach students to spell, add, and listen to stories. He also gives them confidence. Some of the students learned how to operate the bear and would take it to the kindergarten room to present. The program was so successful that the Glen Peters school became the recipient of a stuffed animal. (see the media article in appendix for more information)

A second major solution to the statement was instituted at Lobbestael Elementary. The Divorce Groups resulted in teachers being trained, a program designed and students were chosen to help them evaluate their feelings, realize they were not alone, feel better about themselves and ultimately do better in school. We need to tell you there are so many more individual student benefactors of this mantra and should Mrs. Broad be honored by selection to the Hall of Distinction, hopefully she would share some of these with the attendees. The solutions are UNIQUE and AMAZING and demonstrate that when there is a need, she will go to any length to meet those needs whether it is a big program, like a coordinated curriculum guide for special education or an individual need such as for a selective mute.

The sheer number of parent and student notes are overwhelming. An excerpt from a parent letter from JG says, "You have not only given the children inspiration and self-esteem, you've also extended this to parents." Another parent wrote this, "You're the finest teacher I've ever met. I've never seen a more dedicated, caring and loving person". Student notes express much love and thanks to Mrs. Broad but perhaps this one will be remembered for quite awhile, "I hope maybe I will name one of my kids, Mrs. Broad."

This master teacher extraordinaire not only impacts students but also parents and equally important are all the general education teachers that she has helped to be successful. As you read the supporting letters for her nomination, you will hear – *always finds time to share strategies and resources, passionate about student learning, highly regarded, holds high expectations, has a kind and caring classroom, supports colleagues, a role model, great listener, individualizes instruction, goes above and beyond, has a contagious positive demeanor, genuine, caring and compassionate.*

Cynthia Ann Morgan Broad is a real gem! As Megan Marginet, a L'Anse Creuse social worker wrote, "Cynthia Broad has made an exceptional mark on not only the field of education but also L'Anse Creuse Public Schools and most importantly each student that had the opportunity to be taught by her". Now is the opportunity for L'Anse Creuse to echo the words of the Milken Foundation, "We recognize you. We value you. We thank you", by honoring her with placement in the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction. We thank you for the consideration you give our nominee.

It is my sincere pleasure to support the nomination of Cindy Broad for the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction. During my entire tenure in L'Anse Creuse she was recognized by her peers in special education as an exemplary teacher. Many general education teachers also held her in high esteem because Mrs. Broad willingly helped them bring about success for the special education students they shared.

Mrs. Broad led the elementary special education staff through a major curriculum development process. Under her guidance, the special education curriculum was developed and coordinated by grade levels both horizontally and vertically and resulted in requests from surrounding districts for copies of the curriculum. Her skills in staff development were exceptional and she did numerous presentations for special education staff on special education strategies, materials, and methods. My name is Lyndsey Lawrence and I am currently a teacher in L'Anse Creuse Public Schools. I am writing to you in full support of Cynthia Broad's nomination into the Hall of Distinction.

When I began my teaching career in Fall of 2012, I was assigned a long-term sub position in a Resource Room at Higgins Elementary. I was introduced to Cindy, who at the time, was the other Resource Room teacher. Because I was in the role of "Substitute", it was not required that I had a mentor, however, Cindy decided differently. She knew that with the role I was filling, there would be a myriad of challenges I would be facing, and she wouldn't allow me to face them alone.

One of the most admirable characteristics that I discovered quickly of Cindy was her ability to multitask. I don't mean that in the sense that she could just do many things at once. I mean that in the sense that she could give her ALL, to many, with great intention and focus, every day. When you stopped to talk to Cindy, you were immediately her center of attention. It didn't matter what she was in the middle of, she put everything aside to attend to the needs of her students and colleagues.

In the first few days of working side-by-side with Cindy, I learned just how much of a "Jack-of-all-Trades" Resource Room teachers were required to be. Day in and day out, Cindy demonstrated her art of individualizing instruction, in order to address each child's unique academic and behavioral needs. Cindy would power through her workload and say, "It's not about what's easiest for me, it's about what's best for our kids." Such a powerful statement that I've carried with me back and forth to school every day since then. Cindy wasn't just a Jack-of-all-Trades; she was a Master of Many.

Cindy spent many mornings, lunch periods, and after-school hours teaching me everything that caught my eye about the world of Special Education. She had plenty on her plate, so naturally, I felt bad for taking up her time. She constantly reassured me with these words: "Listen, sister. One day I'm going to HAVE to retire and you'll want to know all of this stuff. I want you to have the best so you can be the best. I want to see you do big things!" So, Cindy did just that. She filled my classroom with resources, taught me how and when to use them, and made me feel like a champion every day I worked with her. I can say with complete honesty that so much of the success my students have experienced throughout the past eleven years, I can attribute to what Cindy taught me.

I cannot think of a better addition to L'Anse Creuse's Hall of Distinction than Cynthia Broad. The legacy she's left throughout our district is one that continues to be seen and felt by so many individuals, and I will continue to teach on and aspire to fill the shoes she left behind.

As a former colleague of Cynthia Broad at Lobbestael Elementary, I am honored to write this letter of recommendation in support of her nomination into the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction.

Although she spent her career as a resource room teacher, Cindy Broad was not just a teacher of special needs students, she taught her colleagues as well. She always found time to share strategies and resources to help us work with children in our own classrooms, whether it be a picture book on a particular theme or a knotted rope to aid in retelling a story. Oftentimes she would be there just to listen after a frustrating day. I remember one such conversation vividly. After venting that a student we shared was just not "getting it", she said to me, "If he didn't have a right arm, would you insist he write right-handed?" "Of course not," I replied. "Well, what you are trying to make him do is just that —telling him he must use his right hand when he doesn't have one. We have to find another way." Those words truly changed me, and from then on I looked for ways to differentiate my instruction and address the various learning styles of my students.

Cindy's contributions to improve education at Lobbestael Elementary and the L'Anse Creuse district as a whole continued throughout her career. At Lobbestael, she was a valuable member of the School Improvement Team, always pushing the staff to think "outside the box" to foster student achievement. Cindy was one of the first teachers to go beyond basal readers and embrace authentic literature to teach reading comprehension. She taught teachers how to apply Bloom's taxonomy to our instruction and even supplied us with our own set of questions for every book we taught. She organized and led faculty and community support groups, such as Students Affected by Divorce. She taught preschool teachers strategies for helping young children with speech and language issues by an innovative method of using "talking animals". She provided training for middle school teachers on how to motivate non-readers through a language experience approach. Through her leadership, L'Anse Creuse was the first school district in the county to create a K-6 Special Education Curriculum Guide.

I know with certainty that every teacher who ever worked with Cindy became a better teacher because of her leadership, her mentoring, the opportunity to learn from her, and most importantly, to see how her students thrived from being in her classroom. She was our role model —someone we strived to emulate.

Cindy Broad is the true definition of an excellent educator, a curricular leader whose influence went far beyond her classroom walls. L'Anse Creuse was fortunate to have her. Her colleagues were fortunate to have worked with and learned from her. She is most deserving to be included in the L'Anse Creuse Hall of Distinction.





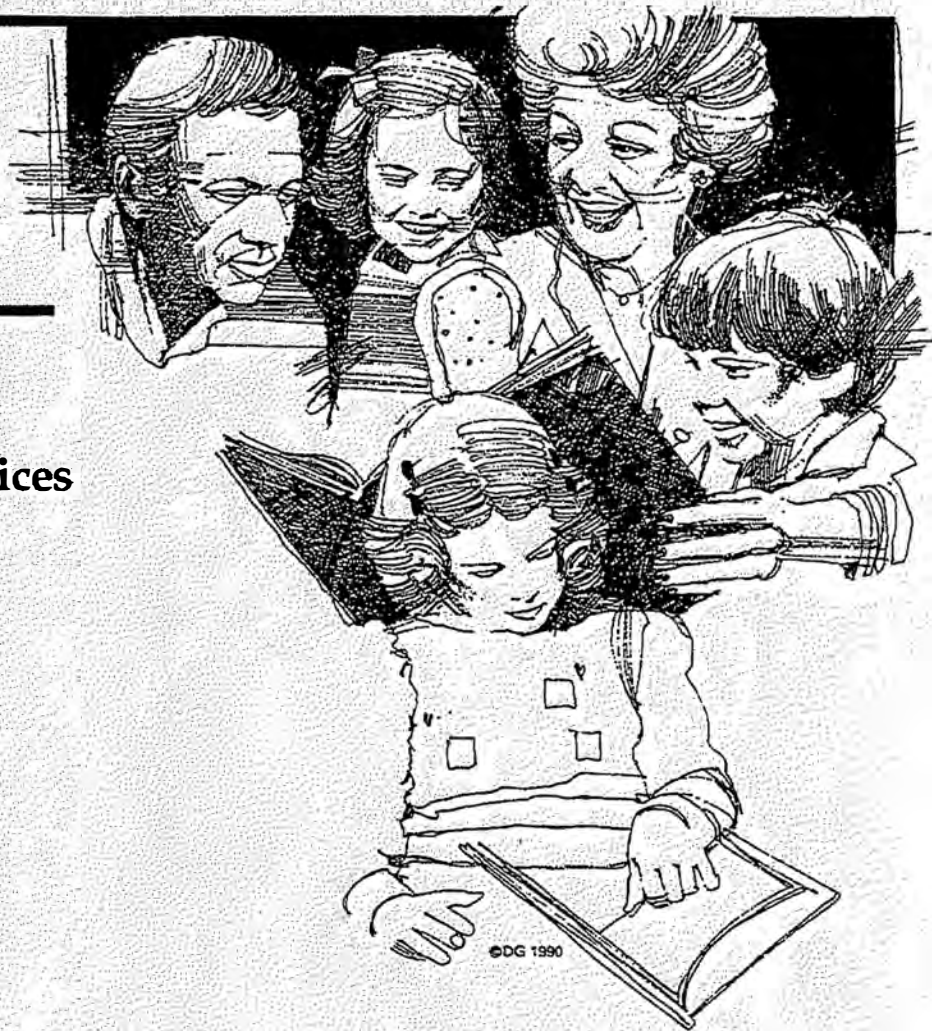

BIOGRAPHY

In completing this section, emphasize factors that influenced you to become a teacher. Describe what you consider to be your greatest contributions to or accomplishments in education.

I decided to enter the teaching profession while in the seventh grade after my youngest brother was diagnosed as having infantile autism. Autism was such an unknown handicap in 1959, there were few programs or teachers to help my brother. I realized then I wanted to teach handicapped students to reach for their potential.

My mother was a strong influence in my life. She was an excellent second grade teacher who spent hours developing well-organized activities which encouraged her students to use their own reasoning, insights, and investigative abilities to arrive at new understandings. I can recall helping my mother in her classroom as she prepared activities and displayed her students' work.

During my high school years my interest in working with special education students continued. I investigated, applied for and was accepted as a teacher's helper at the Riverside Orphanage in Maumee, Ohio, and a teacher assistant at Larc Lane School for the mentally impaired in Toledo, Ohio.

My inspiring college professors encouraged me with an incentive award and a full Masters Fellowship to continue my work with handicapped youngsters.

In 1971, during my second year of teaching, I developed the concept and was awarded State funding for the summer project "Struggling Pre-Schoolers" to address effective teaching strategies for young children with speech and language problems.

In 1972 I conceived, wrote and received State funding for a summer program entitled "Language Experience for Middle School Non-Readers" to motivate middle school aged students in reading and writing. This program was so successful it received recognition from Wayne State University Professors who came with their classes to observe.

In March of 1978 I became the first special education classroom teacher to score 100% on a classroom audit by the Macomb Intermediate School District. This accomplishment included compliments from the Macomb Intermediate School District evaluator, on my organization, structure, and particularly the written performance objectives.

In 1978, to capture student interest and aid the teacher in individualizing instruction, I developed "the talking animal" idea. I worked with the Telephone Pioneers of America, Roseville-Mt. Clemens-Sterling Heights Chapter, to install telephone receivers in stuffed animals. This volunteer group donated the talking animals to handicapped students throughout the area. Thus, a valuable teaching tool for young

students with language and speech problems, was created by community volunteers.

During 1984, I researched Special Education Elementary Curriculum in L'Anse Creuse on the advantages and disadvantages of mainstreaming. The clarity and scope of my final report on the research resulted in the recommendation that regular education teachers needed workshops to help them develop effective teaching strategies for handicapped students. I have presented eight workshops with regular education teachers on such topics as "Behavior Management Techniques", "Reading and Writing Across the Curriculum", and "Storytelling with Good Literature". Elementary special education teachers throughout the district also wanted to be brought together to develop curriculum and work toward developing a single focus. I conceived and conducted twenty-three intensive workshops with the elementary special education staff to write objectives by grade level as well as specific subject outlines. Under my leadership the "K to 6th Grade Curriculum Guide" was developed. I was very humbled when many of the teaching ideas, materials, skills sequencing, subject outlines and evaluation techniques that I had been using for years were so enthusiastically received and incorporated into the District Curriculum Guide. The Macomb Intermediate School District concluded that our Special Education Curriculum Guide was being used by all our elementary special education teachers. The Special Education Elementary Curriculum Guide was the first of its kind in Macomb County. I have enjoyed sharing the guide with many other school districts throughout Michigan.

In 1988, I developed the concept, wrote the grant application and successfully received state grant approval for inservice training of regular education teachers on "Behavior Modification Strategies That Will Work in Regular Education Classrooms". The workshop was so successful that the participants were enthusiastic about implementing the strategies and anticipating the "next" workshop.

In addition to teaching, I find I enjoy serving as a presenter. In March, 1988, my presentation at the 32nd Annual Conference of the Michigan Reading Association concerned "Power Writing" and "The Reading Writing Connection With Bloom's Taxonomy . . . An Exciting Approach For Handicapped Students". This year I am presenting: "An Introduction to The Art of Storytelling for Use By Students as Well as Teachers."

I have never regretted my decision to become a teacher, and especially a special education teacher. There is no feeling equal to the one I experience as I see my students reach new heights and gain the confidence to achieve even more. It is an exciting, exhilarating experience.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Describe your commitment to your community through service-oriented activities including volunteer work, civic and other group activities.

One of my community contributions came in the early years of my college and teaching career as my family worked hard to help the Autistic Community of Northwest Ohio, Inc. purchase land and successfully build a home for autistic adolescents and adults. There were many setbacks and problems. Funds and grants had to be found and contributions from private sources were sought by the organization. Our family working together, giving strength to each other, helped our dream to come true . . . an 80 acre farm where my autistic brother lives with other autistic adults reaching for their maximum potential. My brother is happy and my family is proud. Our time, determination, support of each other, and belief in the end result has had a lasting affect upon my personal life and my teaching career.

From 1978 until 1981, the year my first child was born, I served on the Board of Directors for CLEAVE, Inc., a community organization promoting housing, education and social acceptance of the handicapped. A home designed especially for the handicapped was built in the Mt. Clemens community. I helped write the management plan and, for several years, I worked with the staff as a volunteer developing educational objectives for individual residents.

For several years, I have served on the auction committee for the Center for Creative Studies, Institute of Music and Dance, Detroit. Profits from the auction go to scholarships, grants, research, and funding for students with talent regardless of financial ability and for research on the use of music and dance for handicapped youngsters.

Last summer, I helped organize, sponsor and develop activities for the cultural exchange program for Chinese educators visiting in Michigan. The forty visitors from Hualien Senior Provincial Industrial Vocational High School, Republic of China were each given a polished Petoskey Stone, an assortment of Michigan products, tours of our school and the Eleanor and Edsel Ford House, and an "All-American dinner".

I am the mother of two sons, Travis age seven and Trevor age six. I have organized special programs for their school that supplement the curriculum. I serve on the Lower Elementary School Board and I chair the Special Projects Committee. Several special programs that I created, developed or organized include: a storyteller, handicap awareness week; a reading incentive program; and an illustrator of children's books. I recently developed a Community Resource Book which lists community people who have generously volunteered to fill display cases and talk within classrooms about their hobbies. Utilizing the vast variety of resources available in our community, emphasizing the partnership of school, parents, and community to provide for the educational needs of students is a philosophy I believe in.

PHILOSOPHY OF TEACHING

Describe your personal feelings and beliefs about teaching, including your conception of what makes an outstanding teacher. Describe the rewards you find in teaching.

Education is a challenge to be met with the highest standards. I reach for student academic achievement by making my classes “open”. I work around the learning table, out in the open with students around me. The special education students in my classroom respond to this openness by being open in return.

My favorite way to start the day is to say, “What we will be working on together today is . . . “ I use the phrase “working on” to mean trying to improve. But the most important word I say to my students is “together”. My students feel free to interact with me; we are together as people helping each other.

My cardinal rule is: “Talk to me anytime you want”. No wonder I never eat lunch alone! My students develop a sense of security, knowing that I will always make time for them, and I will always be there to help. I love to see my students put “pencil to paper” without worrying, because they know that a helping hand will always be in reach if it is needed.

The time a sixth grade boy threw his arms around me, cried while placing his head on my shoulder on his last day of elementary school before moving on to middle school, brought tears to my eyes. I whispered, “You’ll be all right. You’ve learned so much. Trust me, you’re a fine young man, and I am proud to have been one of your teachers.” As he listened to me, he drew in a deep breath. I knew he believed it because, it was so true.

So many of my students become my close friends. This is why I truly love to teach. I have a great deal of influence on each of my students. I help each student to develop and begin working toward lifetime goals. I nurture independence. I constantly encourage my students to do more than they thought they ever could, to think for themselves, and to work independently. I communicate excitement and joy in the learning process, because I believe learning is exciting and joyful.

Every student has different needs or interests. Each day, with a great deal of love and understanding an outstanding teacher must be able to nurture, stimulate, inspire, and encourage students, while protecting them from their exaggerated sense of failure. Knowledge and

experiences in the subjects must be taught. This is what I strive for within the classroom. I improve and grow each day with my students.

My rewards in teaching come from my personal ongoing relationships with my students who come back year after year to say, "Hi". My "true" rewards come from seeing a handicapped student learn new skills, helping to build a student's self-esteem and conversing with a young student who has very realistic expectations of himself and sees his usefulness in the real world as an adult.

It is crucial to have a sense of humor in the classroom. Joking with students, laughing at myself and easing tensions when a student is frustrated are daily happenings in my classroom. One student just couldn't imagine getting messy with his hands in finger paint, but when we tried painting with his feet he skated across the paper with excitement and thrill! It wasn't long after that those fingers discovered the fun of finger paint too! I discussed the questions for this nomination with my students. I said that I had a problem. They asked, "What is your problem"? I answered, "One question asks what makes an outstanding teacher. I'm not sure that I am an outstanding teacher. It is what I try to be, but am I outstanding?" One student replied, "If this award was for us would you have a problem?" When I immediately answered, "No", they said, "Well, get this award for us, our room could use this big award." We work together as a family to learn to solve each others problems, and to laugh along the way.

EDUCATION ISSUES AND TRENDS

What do you consider to be the major public education issues today? Address one briefly, outlining possible causes, effects and resolutions.

Students of all ages experience many family problems and the stress that comes with these problems. They may avoid school because of the stress, or come feeling angry, frightened and anxious. While family problems can't be eliminated, students can be taught to deal with the stress of their world . . . a true survival skill for our fast-moving lives. Students who are able to understand their personal and family problems can continue their educational growth.

For example, children bring to school their feelings as parents go through divorce. This problem affects a student's ability to function within the classroom. They worry one or both parents may abandon them, that their peers will shun them or, that their misbehavior caused the divorce. To teach a student who appears uneasy, confused, complains of illness, seems depressed or angry, and acts out these feelings in class is a challenge.

During the 1988 school year, I developed a support program to help children whose parents were going through a divorce. The first objective of the program was to give some of our students an opportunity to express and evaluate their feelings about divorce and separation. Secondly, we helped students realize they were not the only persons who have experienced, are experiencing, or will experience this loss and the related feelings. Thirdly, the program helped the students feel better about themselves.

The program included a Lobbestael support team which met before school once a week for three months. I guided them in developing a curriculum guide and led discussions which focused on children's reactions to divorce. Materials were made to use during discussions with small groups of students. Numerous activities and tasks were developed that actively involved students at all grade levels. Financial support was obtained from the school Parent Teacher Organization. Working with parents, a small group of students in second to sixth grade who needed and wanted support were identified. Positive responses to the support group's efforts came from students, parents and the Michigan Department of Education which concluded we were: “. . . . certainly on the cutting edge here at Lobbestael”.

This is the same approach I have used in my classroom to deal with the emotional

stress of a death in the family, or of a close friend. A student who had left my classroom over eight years ago, returned for a visit. His father had been an alcoholic and had abused the child. In our conversations together we always discussed the fact that he loved his father. On this visit eight years later, he said: "I just wanted to tell you my father died. I knew you would want to know. You are the only one who accepted how much I loved him."

When my father died, I used the students as a support group to talk with, to share the loss and to show the students the value of support groups.

This same approach, organized on a school by school basis and including teaching staff, parents and students can help the students survive educational and emotional trauma of racial prejudice, family violence and neighborhood crime that inevitably rob a child of his future by stopping his educational growth.

PERSONAL TEACHING STYLE

What original or innovative instructional methods have you developed and used successfully with your students? How have you shared these ideas with other teachers?

Regular education and special education students love to turn their paint brushes, crayons, and creative stories loose. The hallway walls around my classroom are always filled with student displays. Students create attractive and practical projects such as mobiles, calendars, puppets and shoebox displays as a result of curriculum studies which require practical applications of reading, writing, arithmetic and listening skills. Study units like these develop valuable skills that are needed and used in everyday life. Students learn to read and follow directions on a recipe, to tell time, and to form dough into letters of the alphabet. Baking helps youngsters to be motivated to learn measuring and math skills. Telephones and walkie talkies help students in verbal role playing. Restaurants within the community have donated menus for students to role play taking food orders. Science and social studies units with hands on experiments and activities have been developed around concepts that students are interested in and truly teach and motivate.

I developed "Port-a-Files Around Literature Books" -- a concept that has turned L'Anse Creuse handicapped students toward literature and reading. With this concept, a student reads the book and then completes projects which move the student through Bloom's Taxonomy, a list of verbs classified for the six levels of thinking skills. The projects improve the student's comprehension, thinking, and basic survival skills. I have taught special education teachers to write their own port-a-files using the literature their students choose. Each teacher can write an individualized project to fit the needs and skills of a specific child. The thinking levels can also be raised or lowered depending on the individual student's need. The key to the port-a-file concept is teaching teachers to write them which I have done in many workshops.

Using storytelling with students so they can retell stories in their own words actively involves students in learning. Imagine: old Hennery Brown with green hair. Out of the pocket of a "story apron" appears long moss-green yarn all tangled and twisted; or the sound of claves from the next apron pocket, making the "clickety clack" of Hennery's cane as he walks to town. Visualize: Bearymore, a bear puppet, asking a student for a hug to show compassion because he must go into hibernation immediately but without a new circus act next spring the circus manager has told Bearymore that he can't return to the circus. How can Bearymore hibernate and work on a new act at the same time? Panel theaters unfold as finger puppets tell the plot of a story and help youngsters feel the patterns of action and sequence. Stories come to life in my classroom. My students read because of the excitement of storytelling which involves them in movement and drama.

I am always on the lookout for new innovative ideas. Many ideas have been obtained from outstanding teachers I have had the privilege of working with. In turn, I find great pleasure in sharing with others.

THE TEACHING PROFESSION

Would you recommend that your most capable students enter the teaching profession?

Justify your answer, whether yes or no.

I believe that by the example of my enthusiasm and dedication to the profession I am daily recommending the teaching profession to all my students with the desire, enthusiasm and ability. A twenty-five year old former student saw me recently and, when asked what he was doing now, he replied, "I help teach welding at the Career Center". It was a proud moment for both of us.

Each day within my classroom, students are working together and helping each other solve problems, encouraging and motivating each other and, most importantly, giving each other strength to keep trying when a problem seems difficult. There are days when it would be hard for an observer to know just who is the teacher. Last week one of my fifth graders was talking with a third grader. The fifth grader said, "Hang in there. I hear you and I understand what you want to say. I am trying to think of the best way to show you how to fix this problem". Students teaching each other. It is a wonderful, motivating way to help students learn and reach out to each other.

While many of my special education students lack the skills and abilities to complete a formal college education and enter a traditional classroom setting, they are learning the joys of teaching through helping and encouraging each other. It is my hope that these students will carry these skills on and even integrate them in their parenting skills one day.

When regular education students work with special education students during lunch recess, it is a wonderful way to encourage teaching. Young people get "hooked" on teaching through the experiences of helping other students and teachers at the elementary level. When one young student is able to help another student . . . it is the greatest feeling in the world and one not easily equalled or forgotten.

The talking animal technique helps students try their talents at teaching. A student picks out a book to read or tell and then goes into the pre-school or kindergarten classes to be the "teacher". A microphone is attached inside the talking-bear. How rewarding it is for the small listeners to hear the talking-bear tell a story and what excitement there is on my students faces as they return from this teaching experience.

THE TEACHING PROFESSION

What would you do to assist teachers in becoming exemplary?

To assist teachers in becoming exemplary and the best they can possibly be, I would continue to do what I have done for eighteen years as a teacher in L'Anse Creuse. I serve as a resource to my colleagues within my building and the entire district. I listen to colleagues and offer positive, supporting suggestions to benefit individual students. I commit time beyond the scheduled day. I have committed myself to continue to develop teacher training workshops and to try out new ideas with children, to share ideas, methods, materials and resources.

Regular education and special education teachers must form a partnership in this most important profession. Through inservice training we can work cooperatively, acquiring new knowledge and sharing each other's innovative ideas. Coordination between ongoing classroom instruction and the specially designed remedial instruction for students who have difficulty learning allows remedial instruction to compliment or help the child with the curricula which he or she must master in the regular class.

I must nurture "the spark" that gives me energy within my classroom and excites me to try new ideas. My enthusiasm helps to excite other teachers during visitations to their classrooms and is so important in the exchange of ideas and as new learning takes place. I must keep the enthusiasm alive so that teaching never becomes dull and just a job . . . teaching will always stay a noble profession in my life.

THE TEACHING PROFESSION

To what extent do you think teachers should be accountable for the outcomes of their students?

Since the early years of my teaching career I have believed in prescriptive teaching. All teachers should find the best way to use this idea of individualization according to learning needs or the writing of individualized learning objectives--not just for the handicapped student, but for every student. I have always written objectives in accordance with the student's needs in cognitive, affective and psychomotor domains. These objectives state what academic or social behavior the teacher expects and the amount of time she feels the student will need to accomplish the specific objective. The teacher decides how she will measure the success of a specific objective. I refer back to these individual objectives as I teach to see if they are being achieved. Progress (or lack of it) on specific objectives can then be used by the teacher to decide if the written objectives are appropriate to the student's learning needs. If the teacher feels the objectives are not appropriate, they can be rewritten for more student success. By using this form of individualized instruction the teacher is always looking at outcomes and not just the methods.

One summer, as part of a state grant I obtained, I taught two sections of pre-school aged children (four and five year olds) with language and speech problems. Some of these youngsters were identified as handicapped through special education but the majority were not yet identified and truly struggling with speech and language. I interviewed parents, speech therapists (when involved), students, and teachers, if available from other pre-school settings, to find specific needs for each section, and then I designed a "pre-test". All preschoolers were given this "pre-test". I then wrote individualized learning objectives, which were shared with parents, and taught my classes around those objectives. At the end of six weeks a "post-test" was given and the growth was charted. Although the individual successes of students were varied, the results met with parent appreciation. The Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum in L'Anse Creuse was astonished at the magnitude of charted success of individual students and commended me for such a successful teaching experience. Prescriptive teaching can be used in regular education with wonderful success for all involved: . . . "And with involvement comes success for all!". My objective in accountability is to match the curricula with the student's needs.

NATIONAL TEACHER OF THE YEAR

As the National Teacher of the Year, you would serve as an ambassador for the teaching profession. How would you fulfill the responsibility of communicating to the public and the profession the importance of teaching? What would be your message to America?

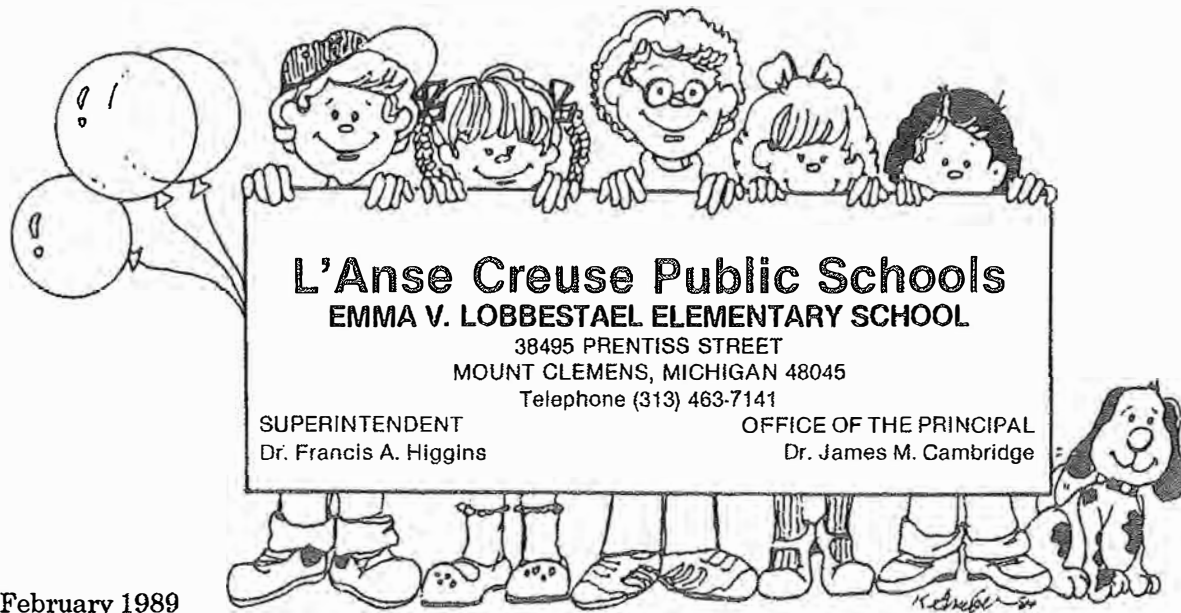

America needs to focus more of its attention on the people who have a tremendous effect on how a child sees the world. The first important people in a child's life are his parents and the second most important people are his teachers. Teachers allow students to begin a personal journey of exploration that should never end. Teachers must encourage and show the parents in America how to help their children read, write, listen, and study at home. Parents must be willing to actively take part and cooperate with their child's school. The most outstanding teachers cannot make a difference unless all Americans, and especially parents, accept, support, and value the importance of their teachers and understand that good teaching is crucial to the youth of America and the generations to come.

Being the mother of two boys, I realize that Americans can look at their youth and dream . . . the youth of America represents America's hope. Teachers in this country must accept the responsibility to teach reading, writing, speaking, listening, thinking and studying by modeling, modeling, modeling. There is no one best way to teach effectively. The professional teacher must be a decision maker. There are really four rules that seem to make a difference in my teaching: to care, be firm, teach responsibility, and be consistent. Teachers should be confident in what they are doing. The best teachers stay “young” by keeping abreast of the current educational research, encourage student success and are not afraid to reach for the next horizon. A good teacher's education never ends!

Teacher of the Year Selection Committee

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen:

The nomination of Cynthia Morgan Broad as Teacher of the Year from our school and school district has involved appraisal, evoked wonderful memories, and the warmest of responses from persons near and far

It has afforded an opportunity to reflect upon the role Mrs. Broad consistently plays in our school and district as a builder of bridges. Her bridges are not those of iron and steel; rather, she is an effective constructor of spans of understanding, love, and knowledge in our district--a unique individual who has a dream of unity between general education and special education, between faculty and community, among all our children; all working in harmony to weave the beautiful mosaic of instruction for students, staff and parents.

For example, working with both general and special education staff, Cynthia accepted a leadership role in developing a program at our school involving discussion groups bringing together volunteer staff members with children experiencing family divorce. Cynthia's group wrote their curriculum, trained and supported each leader, communicated effectively with the community and, most importantly, assisted several groups of our students to cope effectively with the trauma of family schism. This program, Children of Divorce, was specifically cited for its innovation and excellence by Dr. Loren B. Bensley, Jr., Professor at Central Michigan University in the Department of Health, Education and Health Science during an on-site review of our school district Chapter I activities.

Following Cynthia's participation as a panel member at a district-wide "Implementing the New Definition of Reading" in-service this year, an evaluation summary compiled by the L'Anse Creuse Staff Development Team cited many references to her sessions. The words of one enthusiastic teacher will illustrate: "Give Cynthia Broad a full day to present . . . excellent, as usual!"

In school community activities, Mrs. Broad is also outstanding. When our school was privileged to host a visit from faculty members of our sister school in the Republic of China, Cynthia stepped to the fore in devoting countless hours and personal resources in helping to plan a stimulating series of cultural events for our guests who had provided such unique opportunities for our students, faculty, and parents during our visit to their country. When we consider that Cynthia, because of pre-school age children at home, was not a participant in the visit to China, her devotion to the project is all the more remarkable--yet, standard practice for this caring lady!

A school district assistant principal shared this: "Having worked as a counselor in four school districts, I have had the opportunity to attend many Individual Education Planning Committee meetings . . . I have never known a special education, or regular education, teacher who knows the strengths and limitations of his/her students better."

Mrs. Broad's personnel file contains numerous unsolicited letters to the superintendent from joyous parents. Perhaps one parent captured the essence of Cynthia best in this statement, "We are very encouraged by Clare's progress. Her entire attitude toward life in general is becoming increasingly positive. Our

whole family is benefitting from this and we thank you.”

And, from another parent, these words: “You took a little boy who could not read in the sixth grade and taught him how. In doing that you gave him confidence and strength”


Cynthia’s exemplary work also is evident on a daily basis. I regularly observe numbers of general education pupils eagerly participating with her, and her resource room students, in activities during the luncheon period. Our faculty, and I, ascribe this positive interaction among boys and girls as great testimony to her mission being both well-conceived and also successful!

As word of her selection circulated throughout the community, the responses have been heart-warming. The director of special education, Dan Sapp, was elated, stating, “Cynthia is that one teacher that every parent wishes for their child and each administrator hopes to meet once during his career.” I observed a parent receive the news--she literally threw her arms up in exclamation . . . her eyes quickly filled with the tears of joy of a person experiencing a dream-fulfilled! And, my fondest memory is of walking into her classroom immediately after the students had received the news . . . the circle of youngsters with arms and hands clasped around each other, and their beloved teacher, brought tears to even my time-jaded eyes!

I would like to draw upon the prophetic words of two long-ago observers of Cynthia Morgan Broad. Cynthia’s supervising teacher, Angela Lloyd, writing on her student teaching evaluation, forecast “. . . leaps and bounds in the teaching profession for Miss Cynthia Morgan.” And this, from a mother in 1973: “We are very pleased and proud of Skip’s ability to read his little books . . . you should be Teacher of the Year!”

On behalf of those in a wonderful profession blessed with the privilege of working with the most precious possessions of parents and society, I am honored to have experienced the good fortune of being associated with one of the finest practitioners of the art and to say “amen” to the candidacy of Cynthia Morgan Broad, a teacher who has earned the profound respect, admiration, and love of children, parents, colleagues, and peers.

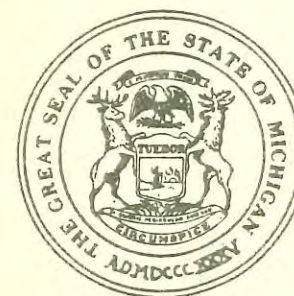



The American Association for State and Local History recognizes many teachers throughout the country. But the Michigan educator whose team efforts resulted in a program that recently received a national commendation from this organization is an art instructor!

Ms. Ameen has been a strong advocate and practitioner of interdisciplinary learning. She has used an integrated program of Art, History and English as the impetus for a highly successful oral history program entitled "Red Dust," resulting in an award winning student produced publication, several award winning multi-image slide shows, and an interdisciplinary learning experience. Using the talents of students in Industrial Arts classes, she implemented a block design lesson; in collaboration with the home economic and language arts teacher, puppets for a puppet show were created for sixth grade students; costumes and masks are designed in her classes for plays; and, a photography unit has students producing slides to be used in English classes' poetry lessons.

Ms. Ameen is involved with numerous community and professional activities and participates in programs for professional and personal development. A frequent presenter, workshop clinician and guest artist, Ms. Ameen is one of this State's educational treasures.

CYNTHIA ANN BROAD

Ms. Broad developed a support group involving community and faculty for elementary students who are affected by divorce; utilizing literature and applying Bloom's taxonomy to comprehension, thinking and survival skills, she developed a program with regular and special education teachers throughout the state; and, the L'Anse Creuse Public Schools became the first in the county to develop a K-6 special education curriculum guide.

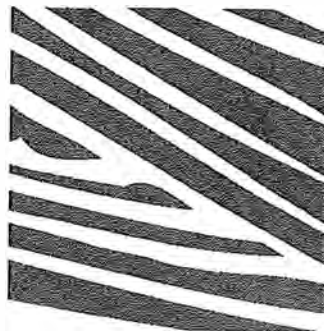
Ms. Broad was named Michigan Teacher of the Year in 1989.

Her supervisor reports that within the classroom, she utilizes methods and techniques that exemplify innovation and adaptation to the varied learning styles of the students. With the building as a whole, she shares a knowledge of effective instruction and is a leader of school improvement. She started out as a teacher aide in a bilingual program, served as a community liaison, child care worker, special education teacher, Migrant Program School Director, Student Club advisor and now as a principal.

Ms. Hernández responds to the challenge and the needs of the large Hispanic population in her school with keen bilingual skills, and effective, articulate communication. The needs of the community do not go unnoticed by Ms. Hernández who has responded by running a Summer Migrant Education Program.

Ms. Hernández has distinguished herself as an inspirational educational leader in Michigan.


JAMES HIETJE

A Cultural Day, Career Day, and a week-long forum for the arts are three of James Hietje's signature programs. His middle school boasts also of team teaching, social programming appropriate for the transient child, intramural activities and an "exploratory hour" of instruction that offers 24 different programs.

James Hietje is an innovator and a solicitor! Five school assemblies on the arts are sought and presented each year to the students of Fremont Middle School. Mr. Hietje's superintendent reports that this educator has a unique ability to motivate children. Many institutions, universities and school districts seek his advice regarding middle school education.

Cynthia Ann Broad, a Region 18 MALDE member from Macomb County, was selected as the 1989-90 Michigan Teacher of the Year by the Michigan State Board of Education.

Cynthia is an elementary resource room teacher at Lobbestael Elementary in Mt. Clemon's L'Anse Creuse District. She was selected from a field of over 90 other teachers who were nominated. Ms. Broad will represent Michigan in the National Teacher of the Year search this spring and will also be honored at a banquet which is being sponsored by the State Board of Education on April 27th.

Following is Cynthia Broad's "Message to America" in regards to communicating the importance of teaching to the American public;

"America needs to focus more of its attention on the people who have a tremendous effect on how a child sees the world. The first important people in a child's life are his parents and the second most important people are his teachers. Teachers allow students to begin a personal journey of exploration that should never end. Teachers must encourage and show the parents in American how to help their children read, write, listen, and study at home. The most outstanding teachers cannot make a difference unless all Americans, and especially parents, accept, support, and value the importance of their teachers and understand that good teaching is crucial to the youth of America and the generations to come.

Being the mother of two boys, I realize that Americans can look at their youth and dream. . . the youth of America represents Americas hope. Teachers in this country must accept the responsibility to teach reading, writing, speaking, listening, thinking and studying by modeling, modeling, modeling. There is no one best way to teach effectively. The professional teacher must be a decision maker. There are really four rules that seem to make a difference in my teaching; to care, be firm, teach responsibility,

Broad Named Teacher of the Year

The Grosse Pointe Yacht Club is proud to announce Cynthia Broad as Michigan's Teacher of the Year.

As a special education teacher for the past 19 years, Broad was selected from 90 other Michigan teachers to represent the state of Michigan for its teaching excellence. She is a special education teacher at L'Anse Creuse in Mt. Clemens where she teaches kindergarten through the sixth grade.

Another aspect of being Michigan Teacher of the Year, that Broad said she enjoys, is the fact that she will be a spokesperson for teachers and will speak before groups such as the Michigan Reading Association, the Chamber of Commerce and others.

She has also enjoyed the chance to visit other buildings in her district and meet with her colleagues. "Everyone has just been so wonderful."

Broad's selection for teacher of the year was initiated by a committee consisting of L'Anse Creuse teachers, students, board members, and Superintendent Dr. Francis A. Higgins.

Robby Cusic, a sixth grade student at Lobbestael, wrote a recommendation for her saying, "When I think of Mrs. Broad I think of a caring and helpful person. Mrs. Broad helped me through the tough times. Mrs. Broad has done a lot for me and other kids."

Cynthia Ann Broad has done a lot for students. Her desire to become a teacher and to teach handicapped students came at an early age. She decided on special education when her youngest brother was diagnosed as having infantile autism.

She was further influenced by her mother, a second grade teacher, who spent many hours preparing for her class. As a youngster, Broad would help her mother prepare activities and displays for the classroom.

Broad began teaching in 1970 and has continually worked toward developing programming to make school and teaching more effective. Some of those programs include; Struggling Pre-Schoolers - teaching strategies for young children with speech and language problems; Language Experience for Middle School Non-Readers - motivation for middle school students to read and write; Talking Animal Program - telephone receivers placed in stuffed animals for teaching young children with language and speech problems; as well as workshop programs: Behavior Management Techniques, Reading and Writing Across the Curriculum and Storytelling with Good Literature.

Cynthia Ann Broad is a dedicated educator, "I have never regretted my decision to become a teacher, and especially a special education teacher. There is no feeling equal to the one I experience as I see my students reach new heights and gain the confidence to achieve even more. It is an exciting, exhilarating experience."

Broad's name has now been placed in competition for the National Teacher of the Year award but the recognition that she has gained among her Michigan colleagues and the excitement her students feel is what is important to her now.

As the activities have intensified, Broad has had to juggle some aspects of her personal life. She has been able to do this through the help and understanding of her husband and two sons. "They have been very understanding and are thrilled by the fact that I was honored in this way."

As to her philosophy about teaching in the United States, Broad said, "Teachers in this country must accept the responsibility to teach reading, writing, speaking, listening, thinking and studying by modeling, modeling, modeling. There is no one best way to teach effectively. The professional teacher must be a decision maker. There are really four rules that seem to make a difference in my teaching: to care, be firm, teach responsibility, and be consistent."

Cynthia Ann Broad's colleagues have planned an evening in January to let her know how special she is as Michigan's and their teacher of the year.

Education is a challenge to be met with the highest standards. I reach for student academic achievement by making my classes "open". I work around the learning table, out in the open with students around me. The special education students in my classroom respond to this openness by being open in return.

My favorite way to start the day is to say, "What we will be working on together today is ..." I use the phrase "working on" to mean trying to improve. But the most important word I say to my students is "together". My students feel free to interact with me; we are together as people helping each other.

Every student has different needs or interests. Each day, with a great deal of love and understanding, an outstanding teacher must be able to nurture, stimulate, inspire, and encourage students, while protecting them from their exaggerated sense of failure. Knowledge and experiences in the subjects must be taught. This is what I strive for within the classroom. I improve and grow each day with my students.

My rewards in teaching come from my personal ongoing relationships with my students who come back year after year to say, "Hi". My "true" rewards come from seeing a handicapped student learn new skills, helping to build a student's self-esteem and conversing with a young student who has very realistic expectations of himself and sees his usefulness in the real world as an adult.

Local woman named top teacher

L'Anse Creuse is home to Michigan's Teacher of the Year

A L'Anse Creuse elementary teacher has been named Michigan's Teacher of the Year. Cynthia Morgan Broad has been working with special education for 19 years.

Broad said her first influence came from her family. "My younger brother was diagnosed as having autism. My mother was a second grade teacher. There were no programs for autistic children at that time, so between the two of us, we taught him ourselves," said Broad.

Lobbestael Elementary, where Broad is currently teaching, nominated her for teacher of the year. Her nomination won out over 90 other teachers in the state. "This is not an honor I sought. When I was told that I had won the state teacher award, I asked how they could pick one teacher out of all those who deserve recognition. I still can't believe they have chosen me," said Broad.

Broad had already received recognition from her peers before the award. In 1971, during her second year of teaching, she developed a summer project titled "Struggling Pre-Schoolers" that taught effective strategies for dealing with children with speech and language problems. The next summer, Broad began a program called "Language Experience for Middle School Non-readers" that would motivate middle school children to read and write. This program was so successful that Wayne State University professors brought their education students in to observe.

In 1984, Broad researched the special education elementary program in L'Anse Creuse and her final report on the schools ended in a recommendation that regular teachers needed techniques for effectively dealing with handicapped students. Her Special Education Elementary Curriculum Guide is now being used by many other districts in Michigan.

Broad said, "All children have potential, and they all have different strengths.



"I still can't believe they have chosen me," said Cynthia Morgan Broad.

It's my job to build on their potential and strength and to give them self-confidence. The children will come to me and say that they don't understand a problem and it's like they're challenging me to teach them. And I will always rise to a challenge."

"Many days I have to protect my kids from their feelings of failure. But in this day and age it's not just special kids, it's all kids. They might be coming from broken homes, or have lost a loved one, and they all need to be made to feel like they are worthwhile people," she said.

"Since I've been teaching special

education, almost half of my kids have been completely mainstreamed. It usually takes two to three years to finish the mainstreaming program. They all go into regular classes for art, music and gym. They need the socialization that comes from mainstreaming," said Broad.

She added, "I've never regretted going into teaching, especially into special education. There is nothing like the feeling of helping a child overcome his problems and reach new heights. I hope I can teach all my life, there so many things to do before I'm through teaching."

L'Anse Creuse special education teacher recognized as top in the state

HARRISON TWP. — The good news was heard over the public announcement system 15 minutes before dismissal on Sept. 10. Lobbstael Elementary students and faculty immediately broke into hearty applause.

When the last bell rang signaling the end of the school day, students filed through a single exit to offer their personal congratulations to Cynthia Broad.

The L'Anse Creuse Special Education Instructor had just received word that she would represent the state's academic community as Michigan Teacher of the Year for the 1989-90 school year.

"It's such a responsibility to represent all the outstanding teachers of Michigan," Broad said. "There are so many of them."

Nevertheless, she embraces the honor with enthusiasm. Broad was selected from a field of 90 contenders.

SHE IS eager to become an 'academic ambassador,' as the award dictates, by sharing her message with students, parents and colleagues.

Although Broad welcomed the award with tears of joy, she was not always so receptive to the idea.

"My first response was: I don't want this. I am not seeking this. Then I realized, this is an honor — these are my peers who nominated me and I got very excited," Broad said.

A 1970 graduate of Bowling Green University, Bowling Green, Ohio, she first became interested in special education while in the seventh grade.

Broad's youngest brother had just been diagnosed with infantile autism. At that time, autism was an unknown handicap.

"There were few programs or teachers to help my brother reach his full potential. My mother, a second grade teacher, said 'in that case, we'll teach him at home' — and we did," she said.

"THAT WAS the turning point for me. That's when I knew I wanted to go into education. My brother taught me more about teaching than any one other person," she said.

During her high school years, Broad, originally from Ohio, volunteered her services at a Maumee orphanage and then a school for the mentally impaired in Toledo.

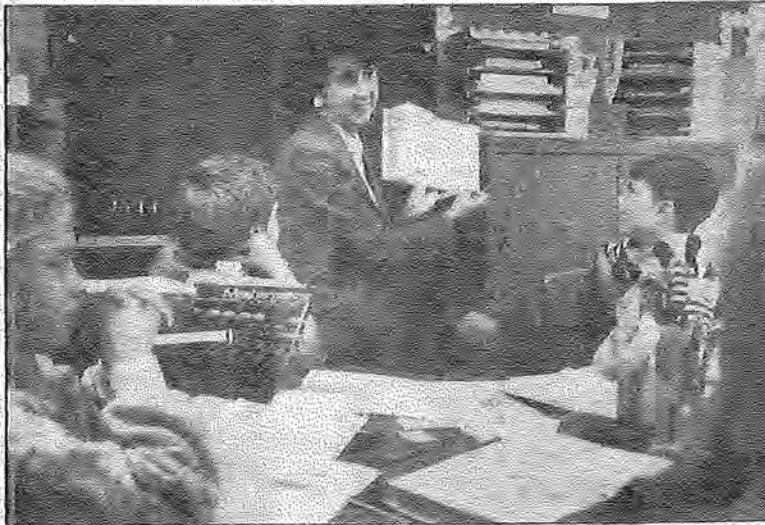
"An outstanding teacher must be able to nurture, stimulate, inspire, encourage, defend and protect students and show a great deal of love and understanding, while having in-depth knowledge and experience in the subject that must be taught," said the 42-year-old mother of two.

"This is what I strive to do every day..."

She stressed that the future success of the nation hinges upon a commitment from all teachers to strive toward these same goals.

"It's frightening because we are on the brink of the 21st century," Broad said. "We can't teach kids all the skills they need to function in the real world, so we have to teach concepts."

BROAD, HOWEVER, does not believe that a child's education is the sole responsibility of

his schoolteacher.

"Parents must actively take part in teaching students fundamental skills, reading, writing and listening," she said.

Her advice to parents and teachers, "Show care, be firm, teach responsibility and be consistent. Children will respond if you communicate excitement and joy in the learning process."

Broad also emphasizes reading out loud to children.

"When you read to kids, they learn to love reading," Broad said.

Cynthia Broad is not all talk and no action.

IN HER 19 years with L'Anse Creuse, the special education instructor has spearheaded many innovative educational programs and developed curriculum to address particular needs of individual students.

One such program, a support group for children of divorced parents, has received wide support from both students and parents.

"In today's society we, as educators, must concentrate on stresses from home and address them," Broad said. "How can a child think about math problems when his parents are fighting and he thinks he might be the cause?"

The support group zeros in on family group dynamics and encourages students to vent their frustrations by sharing common emotions.

"Students must learn how to cope and know that there are people outside the family who can help them learn to talk about their feelings. Then they can relax," she explained.

According to Broad, the kids love the program.

IN THE beginning of the year, we get kids asking 'when is it going to start?' 'When is it going to start?' That's how much they enjoy it," she laughed.

Appreciation for her efforts stretches far and wide.

"Well loved, respected, admired. Almost any positive adjective can be used to describe Cynthia Broad," said her boss, Lobbstael principal Jim Cambridge. Broad is the second represen-

Credits come in all shapes and sizes.

ONE RECOMMENDATION, handwritten in round, fat letters said: "When I needed someone to talk to she was there. Mrs Broad has done a lot of things for me and other kids. That is why I think she should be teacher of the year."

A colleague wrote, "One of the best things about life is friends. You find them everywhere, but you seldom find one of the quality of Cynthia."

That is why Broad never eats alone.

"I tell them (the students) to talk to me any time they want," Broad said.

The students respond with enthusiasm to Broad's open-door policy. Her own students and those from other classes parade through her doors throughout the lunch hour. They set up work stations around the room — some on the floor, others seated at desks — all working on their own special project.

Broad takes her philosophy one step further. She is able to generate a genuine sense of trust among her students.

THE VETERAN instructor relayed the story of a fearful post-boy between herself and a frightened student on the unfamiliar road to middle school.

"A sixth grade boy threw his arms around me and cried, with his head on my shoulder, shaking 'You'll be all right...'," she said.

Broad credits her success partially to the school district in which she teaches.

"Our administration is always open to new ideas," she said. "They are just wonderful."

One of her fondest dreams is to bring all outstanding teachers together for a brainstorming marathon.

"We can learn from each other by sharing ideas," Broad said.

SHE CHALLENGES herself daily by telling the children, "It is my responsibility to help you. If you are having trouble, I will try to find a way."

"I still love teaching. I still have that spark. I'm still growing," Broad said. "They are my inspiration. The youngsters teach me something every day."

Finally, she hopes that education will regain its once lofty status in the United States.

"The most outstanding teachers cannot make a difference unless all Americans, and especially parents, accept, support and value the importance of their teachers and understand that good teaching is crucial to the youth of America and generations to come," she said.

Mount Clemens balks at Clinton incinerator plan

MOUNT CLEMENS — If the Mount Clemens representative's opinion is reflective of the entire Grosse Pointe-Clinton Refuse Authority board, Clinton Township will not be seeing any extra cash.

At the suggestion of Mark Kohl — board member and Clinton Township supervisor — the board agreed to review its by-laws and discuss changing a \$5,000 fee paid to Clinton Township in lieu of taxes.

"As soon as they pay taxes on the county building, we'll pay taxes on the incinerator," said James Hacker, the Mount Clemens representative.

Hacker said the authority shouldn't increase payment to the township. In fact, he said the authority legally doesn't have to pay the agreed upon \$5,000.

"Everybody must bear the burden of public buildings on their property. Mount Clemens happens to have a whole bunch of (tax exempt properties)

"The theory is everybody has to share the burden," Hacker said, adding, "The idea was aimed more to his (Kohl's) constituency than reality."

According to a study conducted by auditing firm Plunk & Moran, the property where the incinerator is located could generate \$350,000 in taxes if the authority paid taxes on the facility.

"I'm not necessarily saying they should pay \$350,000, but I think we need to reach a new agreement," Kohl said.

When the facility opened 17 years ago, the authority agreed to pay the township \$5,000 annually in lieu of taxes. That amount is no longer feasible, Kohl said.

Hacker said he favors reviewing the by-laws, specifically requiring authority members to

dispose of their trash at the incinerator.

"It's our intent to insure the waste stream goes to the incinerator," Hacker said, adding Harper Woods and Grosse Pointe haven't been paying their portion.

Trash from Eastland Mall and businesses along Mack Avenue isn't sent to the incinerator, he added.

Grosse Pointe say they don't have the equipment to pick up refuse from dumpsters," he said.

James D'Allesandro, authority representative for Harper Woods, said trash from Eastland has never gone to the incinerator.

"They've always been exempted. Most of the trash is cardboard and it's extremely difficult to make a pick-up at the center."

A private hauler has been

Teacher is best in state

HARRISON TOWNSHIP

It took her nearly 30 eventful years to reach the top. Now there, she reflected on the past and settled into a conversation about the person who has been the greatest influence in her life.

Leaving back in her chair at Lobbstaef Elementary School, the best teacher in Michigan, according to her peers and the state department of education, talked about her brother Philip.

"He taught me more about what I value now than anyone else," said Cynthia Broad, 1989-90 Michigan Teacher of the Year.

"Material wealth is not important. The potential in a person is what's important," she said.

Perhaps more important than her recent award to her immediate colleagues, Broad has been a special education teacher at the school for six years and is a 19-year veteran of the L'Anse Creuse School District.

When Philip was born into the Morgan family down in Ohio during the late 1950s, he was indeed special, Broad said.

Ten years Cynthia's junior, Philip was diagnosed as having infantile autism.

It was then, as a seventh grader, that the woman an associate would later call a "diamond" decided to dedicate her life to teaching. Initially, the family de-

ecided to send Philip to a boarding school, a decision that Broad now says was a "huge mistake."

That understood, the young teenager and her mother, Elaine, a second grade teacher, would teach Philip at home, Broad said.

"At that time autism was a relatively unknown handicap," said Broad, 42. "We did our best with him at home."

"I was upset that he didn't have a lot of friends," Broad said. "I took him a lot of places with me and gave him a lot of attention."

"I was not forced to do it. I really wanted to do that," she said.

Philip is now living a happy life on a farm in Ohio, his big sister said.

Despite her innate teaching ability, Broad said she did not critique her teacher's performance through her learning years.

And although she "loved helping them," Broad believes she stopped short of being the proverbial "teacher's pet."

"I was very quiet and very shy," she said.

After high school, Broad enrolled at Bowling Green State University in Ohio, where she earned a bachelor of science in education degree in 1969 and a master of education one year later.

It was then, at age 22, that Broad was enticed by a recruiter from the district to bring her many talents to L'Anse Creuse.

"This is a very unique district," Broad said. "The district board and ad-

ministrators empower the teachers to work together. Other districts tell the teachers what to do."

Broad's resourcefulness and innovativeness resulted in her spearheading of the district's first special education curriculum in 1986.

Broad, who beat 90 teachers for the title, shifted in her seat and explained her vision of future education.

"We don't have to reinvent the wheel; we just have to perfect it."

"We have to prepare differently for the 21st century. We have to go from skills teaching to teaching strategies. We have to teach how to analyze better," she said.

The best sources to tap for insight are her peers, Broad noted.

"We should bring all of the outstanding teachers together from around the country and bring up the important issues," Broad said.

"We can't stay stagnant; we have to keep working and give these kids the best education possible."

Working with about eight special education children does not put more pressure on her, Broad said.

She believes there is too much made of categorizing children by the speed by which they learn.

"There is no more mental wear and tear," she said. "We work slowly and emphasize the positive things these kids do. I ride the emotional roller coaster with them."

Lobbstaef principal Jim Cambridge said Broad's wealth is shared by the rest of the school and community.

"This is a great experience and everyone shares in it," Cambridge said.

"Everyone here is even more upbeat than before. The whole school is now a winner. Everyone shares Cynthia's joy. This is a boost for the whole community."

Broad is the second teacher from the L'Anse Creuse district in the '80s to

win the state title, and the second consecutive winner from Macomb County.

Mel Miller, a social studies teacher from L'Anse Creuse Middle School North, won the state title in 1981 and went on to be a national finalist. Andrea Willis from Holden Elementary School won the state title last year.

As the conversation drew to a close, Broad leaned forward and with few words explained why her students think as much of her as she does them.

"I love teaching," she said. "I never want the kids taken away from me."

Michigan Teacher of the Year dedicates self to kids

Named 1989-90 Teacher of the Year by the Michigan State Board of Education, Cynthia Ann Broad of Grosse Pointe Shores said she thought of turning down the honor in the early stages.

"Then I thought, 'this would be good for the kids,' and that's the only reason I'm doing this. Now I'll be able to share my

ideas with other teachers and more kids will be reached."

Reaching kids — letting them know they are worthwhile, that they have something to offer, letting them know it's OK to ask questions if they don't know — that is the way Broad, 42, teaches.

The children she teaches at the Emma V. Lobbestael Elementary in the Mount Clemens school district are special educa-

tion students — students who have given up on themselves.

"Some of them come in from other classes with such frustrating attitudes," she said. "They look at me and say, 'I've had trouble with this subject in all my other classes. What are you gonna do that's different?'"

Broad's approach to teaching is different, and she says the results are heartwarming.

"I'm not really skill-oriented

in my classes," she said. "Sure I teach the skills, but I also teach them strategies. I ask them, 'Where can you go to find the answers?' And when we're reading together, I'll ask them what they think is going to happen. That's how I'm coping with gong into the 21st century."

"I'm not trying to turn out scholars, but people who are proud of themselves."

For example, as a candidate

for Teacher of the Year, Broad had to answer, in essay form, a number of questions ranging from her philosophy of teaching, the issues and trends in education and her personal teaching style.

After writing rough drafts, and having them corrected, she would take them into class and ask her students for help.

"They saw the sheets with red marks all over them and they

couldn't believe that their teacher had to rewrite something," she said, laughing. "But I firmly believe that teaching shouldn't be up here," she raised a hand above her head. "We all need to work together."

When Broad's father died, she shared her grief with her students, showing them that it's all right to cry and to feel. "I think

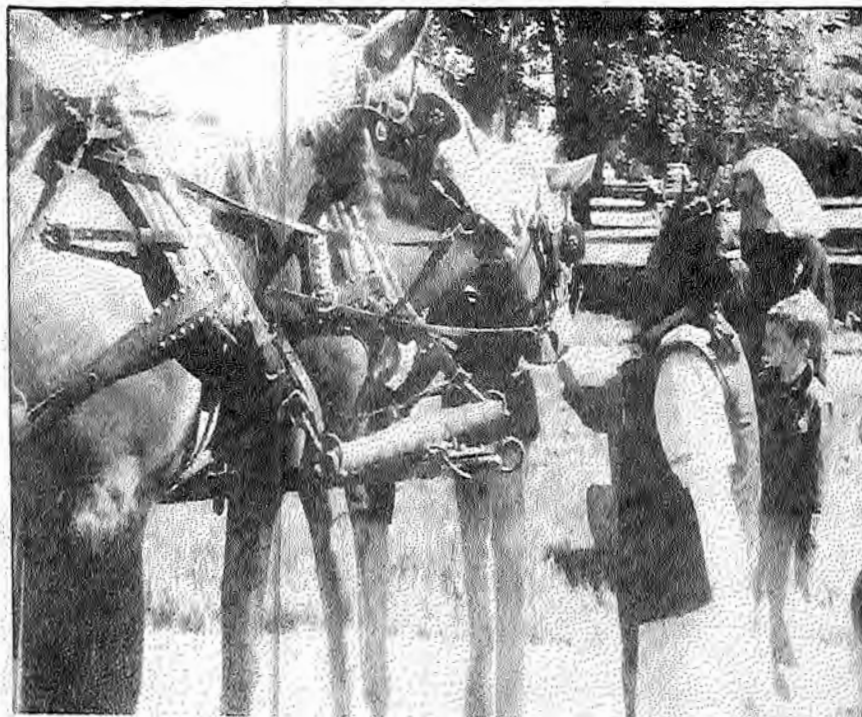

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Fall leaf composting postponed, not dead

The Grosse Pointes' efforts to do the right thing environmentally have been stalled by funding procedures at the state level.

Officials at the incinerator authority are hoping that the state Legislature will release funds for the Clean Michigan grant that will buy the equipment necessary to compost leaves — in time for the fall leaf season.

The land is prepared, a composting permit issued by Clinton Township where the incinerator is located, but we can't do anything till we get the money," said Robert Nugent, chairman of the authority.

"We have talked to manufacturers and they selected the equipment," said Nugent.

"We have it in three weeks (after the manufacturers are ready).

deal with the grants this month. If the delay extends into leaf season, as it probably will, the cities will stockpile the leaves, probably at park parking lots.

The composting site will occupy about five acres, about one-fifth of the property, which also includes the incinerator itself, a lake and a metal-sorting area. All of the installation is screened from the surrounding neighborhood with landscaping and trees.

When the composting program actually gets started, Grosse Pointe residents won't be able to notice.

"Pickup and delivery will remain exactly the same," Nugent said. Four of the Pointes use vacuum trucks to pick up leaves; the Farms is still using plastic bags.

"We're going to experiment to see if we can handle bagged leaves," Nugent said. "We can't do them manually. Maybe our

Last year more than 6,200 people died in fires in the United States, only 20 percent of them in home fires.

The Grosse Pointe City Public Safety Department, working with national fire prevention groups, is trying to increase public awareness during Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8-14.

This year's theme is "Big fires start small. Keep matches and lighters in the right hands." Parents, teachers, babysitters and other adults supervising children are urged to teach youngsters that fire tools are for adults only.

A child's curiosity about fire is natural, but children must be protected from their own curiosity. More than 200 people, one each year in residential fires caused by children playing with matches. Three-quarters of the victims are children under 6.

Education is important, but intervention is necessary as well. Adults are asked to move matches and lighters to places inaccessible to children.

City fire officials urge residents to install smoke alarms in every floor — and make sure they work. Have furnaces and chimneys cleaned before the heating season. Every family should have an escape plan in case of fire.

City residents who would like a free home inspection for fire hazards may call the department at 886-3200.

it's very healthy for them to see that," she said.

"This shows them that I have weaknesses, too, but I don't let them hang me up."

"I say the students in my class are on a journey with me, a journey toward reaching their potential. But it is a journey I'm taking too."

Some students have made that journey successfully — some through mainstreaming and beyond. She is heartened when she sees her mainstreamed students helping other students.

"I wish we didn't have the word 'special education' label," she says. "I'm trying to remove the labels and the attitudes of special education."

It isn't often that she spends her lunch time alone in the teacher's lounge, she cats with the students, some who are going through hard times at home and need to know that adults can still care.

Broad is with her students only three hours a day in the classroom — the rest of the day she works on curriculum for the district and looks for ways to help other teachers — but that doesn't mean she doesn't keep in contact.

"I keep telling them I still want to teach," she said. "I tell them not to take my children away from me. I love what I'm doing."

Broad's reason for teaching goes back to the year she was in the seventh grade. Her brother was diagnosed as having intellectual autism, a condition not much was known about at the time.

"It was really very frightening for all of us," she said. She remembers the tears, fear and the

emptiness felt when he was sent to a home for a few years. "It wasn't right," she said. "We missed him, so we brought him back home."

"I learned so much from him that I wanted to reach out and help other kids like him," she said.

Broad's mother was also a teacher. She worked in the inner city, looking for new and innovative ways to motivate students there.

"I did not teach," she said. "She did so much."

It is not only her relationship with her students that Broad was honored, but also for the work she does with other teachers. Through her workshops she shares her teaching methods with other educators, in the hopes that she'll reach more kids.

"There are so many great teachers out there who need to share their talents. They have to open their doors and work with other teachers so that the students can benefit," she said.

"To me teaching is an art. But it is an art form that can learn. I'm still learning, too, because they always teach me what I can give them."

Broad will represent the state in the national competition next spring.

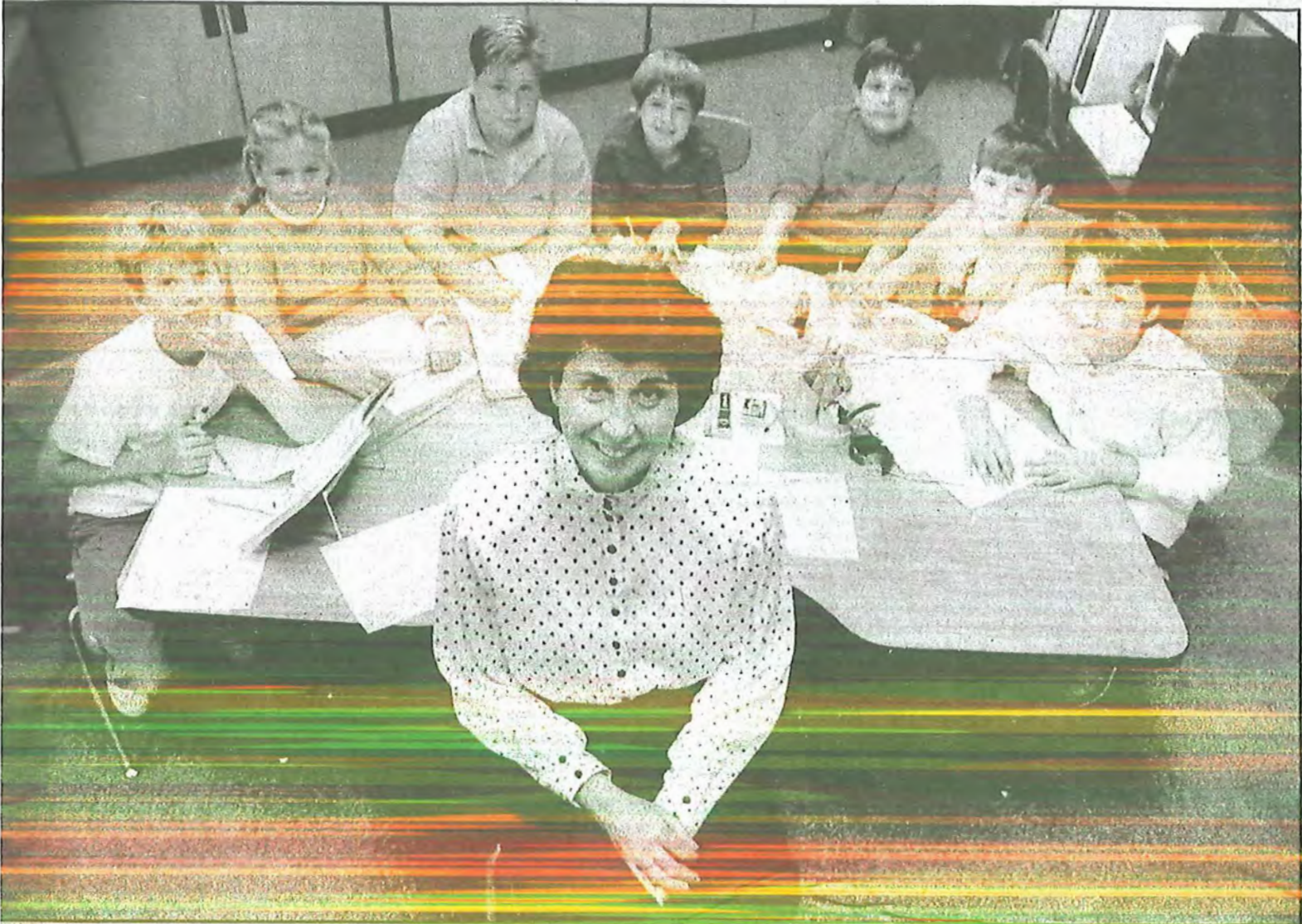

Talking bear helps children learn

CHESTERFIELD TOWNSHIP — Soupy Sales had his White Fang and Black Tooth, but the children at L'Anse Creuse Creuse Green Elementary have George, the talking bear.

A soft, fuzzy, four-foot creature, George does more than fool around with students in the special education classes of teacher Cindy Broad.

He helps teach them how to spell, add and listen to stories. He also asks questions and gives directions.

But most important, he gives them confidence, Mrs. Broad said.

The unique animal is operated by Mrs. Broad, who speaks through a phone behind a partition in another part of the room.

The special phone set is connected to a microphone and speaker in the bear's tummy. The children stand in front of him to talk.

The students have received George well, even though some realize that Mrs. Broad really does the talking.

"I can individualize the questions with the talking bear and ask them what they learned that day," the teacher explained.

"I encourage them to ask questions of the bear, too," she added.

An unexpected bonus came when two students learned how to operate the bear and go into kindergarten and pre-school rooms, delighting the younger children who fully believe in George.

(The name was voted upon by Mrs. Broad's students.)

For example, pupil Tom McCaleb read to a kindergarten class last week, seriously drilling students as he went along. He then answered a string of questions about bears in general — what they eat, where they hibernate, and so on.

"I had to learn how to hold the phone without letting go of the talk button, so they wouldn't know I was behind the partition," Tom said. "They were shy," he added.

In fact, students put their heads down when Tom entered and exited the room to keep up the pretense.

Tom visited the library several times to come up with his plethora of information, dramatically increasing his reading ability, Mrs. Broad said.

Another student, Jerry Hill, is learning to manipulate George, for pre-school class presentations.

"They really believe me," Jerry said with a broad smile.

The bear was a gift from the Telephone Pioneers of America, Roseville-Mount Clemens-Sterling Heights chapter, consisting of phone company employees with 18 years or more of employment.

The equipment was surplus, the bear donated by a Detroit firm, and the time all volunteered, according to chapter member Don Austin.

The idea started when Mrs. Broad asked the group to create a talking animal after the group donated a simpler device connecting two phones three years ago.

"It took us a couple of dozen hours to put this bear together," Austin said. "It is the first one of its kind in this area. Now we are putting together another one for the Glen Peters School."

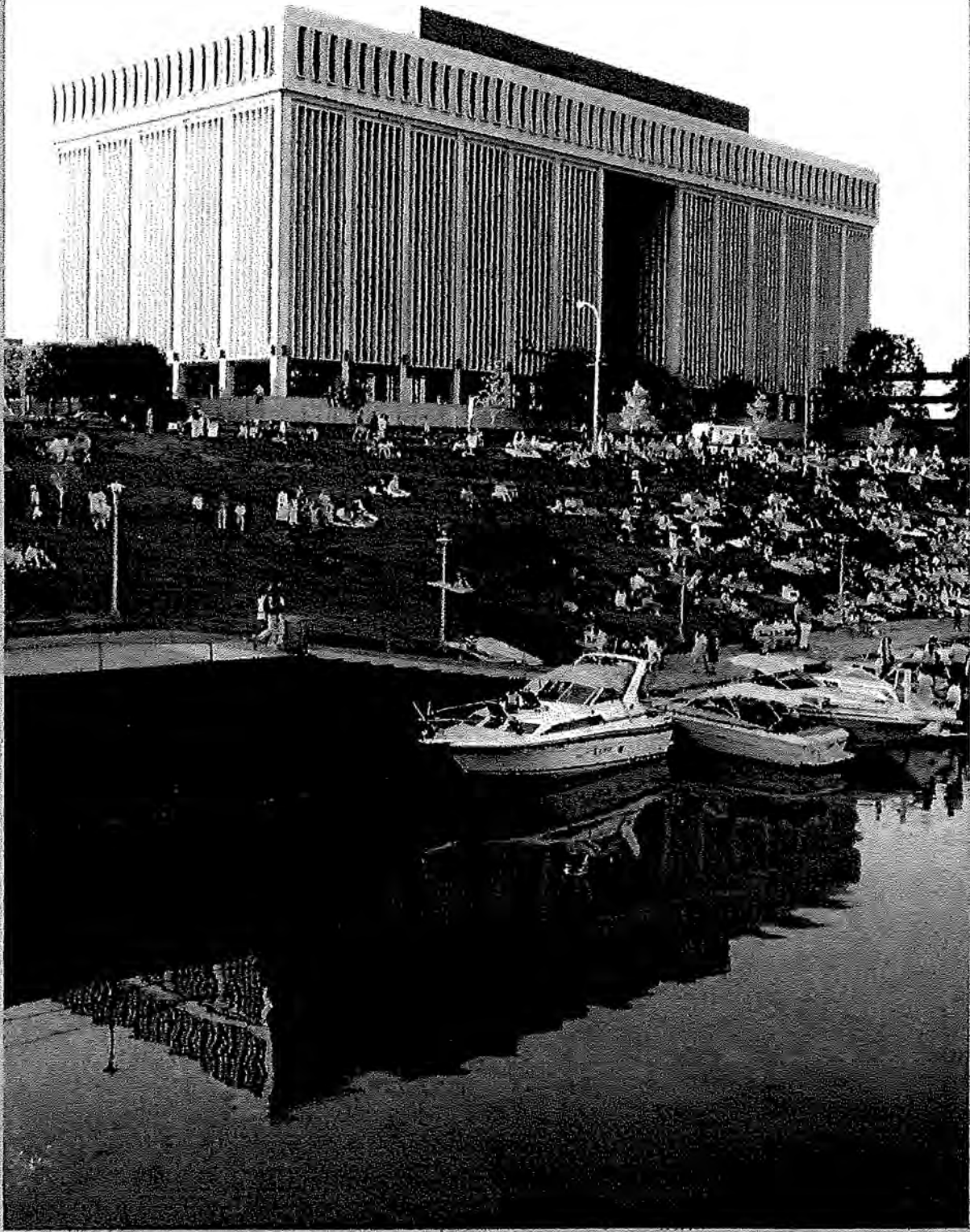
Working with Austin are Art Schuemberger, Tom McDonald, Jim Placido, Pat LaBelle, Richard Sher and Mike Ziemba.

Responses to the Address

response from Ann Richards' immediate audience was enthusiastic. was interrupted by cheering and applause more than forty times her speech was followed by a spirited demonstration in the Omni /vention Hall. While demonstrations are routinely staged at political entions, the enthusiasm of individual delegates was genuine. veral theatrical and literary observers assembled by *The New York es* were less uniform in their appraisals. One commented on ndard clichés" and another criticized the "tired opening." One mented on slow delivery in the opening, and another found the ch "a little sad . . . in comparison to the intellectual speeches" of i Stevenson at past Democratic conventions. But one of these rvers said he was moved and stated: "I found the content derful. . . . It made me feel good about being an American. It was t I believed" (Reinhold, 1988, p. A17). Some rhetorical critics would argue that Richards' personal anecdotes, concrete examples, and f narratives reflected an emerging "feminine style" (Dow and Tonn, 3, p. 289).

ly Tomlin wired a one-word message: "Triumph," and Anna adlen wrote in *The New York Times* that Richards "gave a woman's ech without for a moment losing the men" (Diehl, 1988, p. 1). One ie most important responses came from Michael Dukakis who said: ow can I match that?" (Toner, 1988, p. A1). Possible long-term onses came from Texas voters two years later. A Democratic pollster said before her address: "This is her debut. . . . This could positively te her. Or deflate her" (Pedersen, 1988, p. 22). One visitor at the vention was sure it would deflate her; Jim Mattox, her upcoming onent in the gubernatorial primary, said: "People won't remember weeks later who made that speech" (Slater, 1988, p. 8A). Twenty-it months later, Ann Richards was elected Governor of Texas.

Cynthia Ann Broad



Background

She is an outstanding teacher who goes out of her way to educate, inspire and assist her colleagues. I know of no other teacher who devotes so much of herself to both her students and other teachers. She is an inspiration to me on a daily basis. (A respondent to the editors' speaker survey, July, 1991).

Cynthia Ann Broad is a special education teacher at Grosse Pointe Shores, Michigan, with twenty-one years of teaching experience. Her speech was given in acceptance of the state Department of Education's "Teacher of the Year" award, 1989–1990. Broad was selected from a pool of ninety outstanding teachers nominated for the award. She has also been named an "Outstanding Teacher of America" (1972) and more recently, she received a national educator award from the Milken Family Foundation. She was one of ten educators in the country selected for the \$25,000 award. Broad is also an educational honorary member of Delta Kappa Gamma International Society, nominated by her colleagues.

Unlike many parents, teachers, and administrators, Broad believes in "mainstreaming" children with disabilities into classrooms with so-called normal children. "My dream is that special ed and regular ed will be one" (Angel, 1989, p. 1A). Broad has known her chosen profession since seventh grade when a younger brother was diagnosed with infantile autism. "I realized then I wanted to teach handicapped students to reach their potential," she said in an unpublished biography written for the teaching award. Her work day is divided between the classroom and conducting workshops for other teachers to demonstrate how special education students can be successfully placed in "regular" classrooms.

Initially Broad refused to be nominated for the Michigan teaching award, but she decided to accept if she could share the honor with her students and colleagues. "One of my teaching philosophies is to utilize the vast variety of resources available in the community . . . emphasizing the partnership of school, parents, and community" (DeFrancisco, 1992h). The award allowed her to affirm these resources. In response, the community declared an official "Cynthia Ann Broad" day of celebration January 25, 1990. In referring to Broad's award and the honor it brought to the entire school district, her school principal, Jim Cambridge said, "Everyone here is even more upbeat than before. The whole school is now a winner. . . . This is a boost for the whole community" (LaRue, 1989, p. 5).

On the day of the celebration, there was an all-school assembly where Broad was honored and where she gave what others described as a very moving presentation. Broad chose to tell a story, since the majority of the audience were children. A local newspaper writer said she captured the attention of 300 children plus adults as she acted out the story of *Pinocchio* and compared teaching to the work of the old wood carver (Mooty, 1989, p. 1). "Teachers are artists and creators, just as are wood carvers," Broad said (DeFrancisco, 1992h). "The wood carver begins with a block of wood as it is, and shapes it, brings life to it. Teachers do much the same when they accept the child as she or he is, then work to help that child develop."

The speech included in this collection was given at the climax of that

day of celebration. A dinner/reception was held in her honor at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club. After the dinner several colleagues, friends and state officials spoke to honor the teacher prior to her keynote address. When Broad approached the podium to speak, the audience gave her a standing ovation. Before beginning her prepared comments, she gave special thanks to her mother, a colleague, and her brother for being there. She also introduced the student teacher she was currently supervising, saying, "She's a keeper." Broad had a written manuscript, and knew it well since she referred to it only occasionally.

Approach of the Speaker

Two years after the speech, Broad reflected, "I don't consider myself a speaker or speech writer. I see it as teaching and sharing. When I write a speech I do a mapping of words, thoughts that have meaning to me and integrate them in the speech" (DeFrancisco, 1992h). In her thoughts for this speech were the events, personal influences, and previous students in special education which she felt would be most inspirational to the audience.

She said: "The speech was so me. You can see Michigan in that speech—Thomas Edison, Port Huron. . . . It [the speech] goes back to my childhood—watching the space program on T.V. as a child, and the effect it had on me. We were going to use Christa McAuliffe's research from space in class." Broad said the class was watching Christa as the space shuttle *Challenger* lifted off and then exploded on January 28, 1986. In her speech she wanted to remember the feelings her class had shared that day: frustration, shock, and sadness.

In more general comments, regarding her role as a public speaker representing Michigan teachers, she said, ". . . it's frightening for me to be a representative for the many teachers, so I hope I can communicate the way teachers feel today" (Mooty, 1989, p. 1). She said her goal in public speaking is "to bring all men and women together to get excited, celebrate teaching. . . . It keeps going back to the children. Without the students I wouldn't be teacher of the year" (DeFrancisco, 1992h).

"I Touch the Future: I Teach"

Thank you. I'm thrilled, excited—even a little overwhelmed by all this attention. But I'm honored and privileged to be acknowledged by all of you. All of us tonight, for a brief moment, are celebrating the worth of teaching.

And I say unhesitatingly, we need to celebrate the value of teachers in our society. [Applause]

Even though there is a dark cloud over our educational system, even though educators must deal with public criticism and huge societal problems, problems such as illiteracy, poverty, crime, child abuse, and divorce.

In spite of all this, teachers need to be recognized for their tremendous efforts to bring out the best in our children and in doing so, the best for our society.

So I would like to share the recognition you have given me with all the men and women in education, who day in and day out—and often with very little notice—try to light the spark of curiosity and to plant the seed of success in the hopes of creating a bright future for their students, who will in turn, help our country live up to the promise of its great beginning.

I remember another teacher who lived and died trying to carry out that mission.

It was this week, four years ago, on January 28, 1986, when the solid rocket boosters on the space shuttle *Challenger* ignited.

I remember—as I'm sure you do—a moment of immense pride, nearly extinguished by painful loss, when Christa McAuliffe “slipped the surly bonds of earth” in the pursuit of passion—of learning—adventure.

She represented the aspirations of all teachers—and of countless millions of Americans who dreamt of a future of unlimited potential—who identified with her free spirit and personal courage.

She made us all proud to say—“I touch the future, I teach.”

I think Christa would have liked one of my favorite quotes. It reads: “In times of change, it is the learners who will inherit the earth while the learned will find themselves beautifully equipped for a world that no longer exists.”

She recognized that good teaching requires the ability to learn and to adapt to new conditions and expectations.

She recognized that teaching is an instrument to empower those whom she taught.

A poem in her college yearbook by Ralph Chaplin is a fitting memorial to her mission, as a teacher.

Entitled, “Mourn Not the Dead,” the last stanza reads—

But rather mourn the apathetic throng
The cowed and the meek
Who see the world's great anguish and its wrong
And dare not speak!

Christa McAuliffe stands as an inspiration to all of us. She encouraged all of her students to push themselves as far as they could go.

She encouraged a high personal standard of success—independent of the success of others.

To be acknowledged as The Michigan Teacher of the Year is especially significant to me because, for the first time, the field of special education is being recognized as part of the mainstream of American education.

It's an acknowledgement that public schools have the obligation to educate *all children*—the central premise of Public Law 94-142—the Education of All Children Act.

In the pursuit of excellence, it's easy to give more attention to those children who already seem to have a head start towards success and to relegate the more difficult child to the background.

We can't afford such impatience in the name of efficiency. We simply can't predict human success or failure.

I'd like to tell you the story of two children—two educationally handicapped children.

The parents of the first child were not considered successful. His father was unemployed with no formal schooling. His mother was a teacher—and there was probably tension in the family because of this mismatch.

This child, born in Port Huron, Michigan, was estimated to have an IQ of 81. He was withdrawn from school after three months—and was considered backward by school officials.

Physically, the child enrolled two years late due to scarlet fever and respiratory infections. And he was going deaf. His emotional health was poor—stubborn, aloof, showing very little emotion.

He liked mechanics. He liked to play with fire and burned down his father's barn. He showed some manual dexterity, but used very poor grammar. But he *did* want to be a scientist or a railroad mechanic.

The second child showed not much more promise.

This child was born of an alcoholic father who worked as an itinerant and a mother who stayed at home.

As a child she was sickly, bedridden, and often hospitalized. She was considered erratic and withdrawn. She would bite her nails, and had numerous phobias. She wore a backbrace from a spinal defect and would constantly seek attention.

She was a daydreamer with no vocational goals, although she expressed a desire to help the elderly and the poor.

Who were these children?

The boy from Port Huron became one of the world's greatest

inventors—Thomas A. Edison.

And the awkward and sickly young girl became a champion of the oppressed—Eleanor Roosevelt.

These children—and thousands like them—touch the heart and challenge the mind, but they are the children I love to teach and children we can't afford to ignore.

And so I'd like to say "thank you" to my colleagues, administrators, and the parents of my students. Their encouragement, support, and active involvement in creating an exciting, challenging, and joyful learning environment has created a climate for success for me, for L'Anse Creuse Public Schools, and for my students.

And truly it is my students who won this award for me.

I discussed the nominating questions for this award with my students. I said I had a problem.

They asked, "What's your problem?"

Responses to the Speech

Excerpts of Broad's speech have been printed in various publications (Reader's Digest, 1991; Vital Speeches, 1990). Detz (1991) quoted a portion of the speech in a self-help book on public speaking. Detz said, "Listen to the beautiful power of this acceptance speech. . . . Try reading the excerpt aloud so you can appreciate the full impact of her message" (p. 16).

Broad herself recalled the immediate audience responses. She said, "I was quite taken back with the response of the audience afterwards. A lot of them had index cards with written compliments—proclama-

tions." The comment which perhaps touched her most came from Nick Ciaramitaro, State Representative: "You've inspired me so much that I just want to go back to school" (DeFrancisco, 1992h). Ciaramitaro said he could not read his prepared comments to her after hearing such a moving speech.

Several audience members responded to a survey by the editors. One person wrote, "Cynthia has a marvelous presence when she speaks, it reflects how she really feels. The intensity, the seriousness of purpose, and her love of children are very evident when she speaks. . . ." Another wrote, "Cindy is a natural speaker who uses her tone of voice and enthusiasm to keep the listeners with her. That is something you cannot evaluate from reading the text of her remarks."

Several commented on the focus of the speech, "I touch the future; I teach." The allusion to Christa McAuliffe, teacher and astronaut, was "uncomfortable" for one, and "moving" to others. One respondent said: "I literally had goose bumps over my body and tears in my eyes," as she listened to McAuliffe described as a symbol for teachers who try to inspire students.

Broad's speech had this long-term effect on another teacher:

My attitude toward my professional responsibilities as a teacher were improved by Cindy's speech. In a period of continual ridicule of the educational system, I was proud . . . and encouraged to continue to study and increase my efforts to provide the best possible learning environment for my students. I also found my focus with individual children changed. . . . I began trying to enhance the child's self-esteem. . . . The result was an increase in the number of approaches used with the children who were having difficulty. Those children were much more positive and willing to put forth a solid effort. . . .

Administrators were also affected. Sally DeSchepper, Grosse Pointe Shores' school board vice-president said: "Cynthia Broad conveyed to me that [there are] new and innovative ways to deliver the learning process. . . . It will be necessary for school districts and the community to adapt to those changes. All students can learn."

Several respondents affirmed that it is the speaker's daily actions which make her words so inspirational and influential. "I am aware first-hand that these are Cindy's words and sentiments. . . . These words clearly represent Cindy's actions."

have poor language development, suffer from cultural differences, or lack proper parental guidance.

The task that faces us is not to lower the educational expectations for at-risk children, but to provide the support services that will enable them to meet the standards.

In my considered opinion, we need to get education right from the start. It is an initiative where educators can take a lead, but can't carry out alone. In many ways it is a job for all of our social institutions. Who ever is responsible, this nation needs to move aggressively in the early education years to insure that students come to school with the desires to achieve.

The initiative makes so much sense, and we have documented solutions in Headstart and Chapter I that border on the amazing; yet, our federal government has not moved aggressively in this area. One can only conclude that at-risk students do not have powerful advocates or perhaps they have not been important economically. It has been my experience that powerful political eagles don't flock unless business, the economy and the future are at stake. Well, the clock is running. And, as the TV ads say, "pay me now or pay me later."

Finally, we must build the capacity of people charged with educating our youth. The success of the educational system to meet the needs of its clients very much depends on the cooperation and attitudes of those who do the work. And please, no more lip service to teachers — we must recognize, reward, and renew this essential key professional group.

Talented teachers must be given incentives to sign on, provided opportunities for continued renewal of their knowledge and spirit, provided opportunities to influence and share the major decisions about teaching and learning, and charged with the responsibility to solve problems we have reviewed today. Some promising steps have been taken to strengthen

human capacity. The move to certification by a National Board of Professional Teaching Standards and the National Board of Administrators Standards are two endeavors worthy of your support of our national leaders and with your philanthropy.

In summary, I believe the American public education system is at a period in history where it will be judged either as the catalyst that maintained America's competitiveness or that led to its demise. The decade of the 90s will be our educational system's greatest test.

Today, I have reviewed the need for a great educational renewal, described a response that helped one state make progress in the 80s, and proposed this agenda to create an internationally competitive school system we must:

1. Send the right literacy message.
2. Shift to a results oriented system.
3. Build connections between achievement and employability.
4. Focus on those most resistant to education, and
5. Build the human capacity of the educational system.

Members of the New York Rotary, time after time you have displayed the courage to collaborate — to see problems and try to solve them. Your philanthropic endeavors to address issues of concern with the New York City Schools is well documented.

My hope for education's future rests with institutions, like the Rotary, collaborating with the educational community through meaningful partnerships and foundations, with scholarships, and with their political clout, to push the educational agenda. You know, all that is really needed is a commitment to do something together. That is the kind of commitment the Rotary has made and as one educator, I appreciate it.

Background:

The CTE program had \$160,000.00 available to apply toward the renovation/refresh of the autos at Pankow. We knew the cost of the proposed work could be above the available dollars, so the Board of Education approved a not to exceed cost of \$160,000.00. The projects were bid in a fashion which allowed us to pick projects that fell within the available dollars. This is funded with 61a and 61d funds.

Current Status:

Bids were received for painting, epoxy for the floors and lighting. Lighting for all 4 areas came in at \$96,705.00, Epoxy for 2 of the bay floors is \$53,370.00 (the Director wants to hold off on the 3rd bay at this time), and the painting of the walls for all 4 areas is \$26,000.00. We are able to complete everything except the painting of walls in 2 of the areas with the approved dollars.

The new fiscal year has allowed for new 61a funding. It would take approximately \$20,000.00, to complete the painting for all of the original scope of work and that would include a small contingency. Pankow receives about \$700,000.00/yr. in 61a funding for CTE.

Future Direction (Notes or Comments)/Recommended Motion:

Administration is seeking approval to use an additional \$20,000.00 of 61a funds to complete the original scope of work. All areas have been emptied out which makes this an opportune time to complete the original scope of work.
