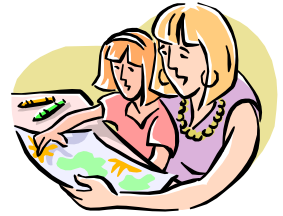




Literacy Websites for Children and Parents
